



Casting Tips by Capt. Pat Damico, MCI

Casting tip 24:

Using false casting, not allowing the fly or line to hit the water or grass surface allows us to see how well our loops form. The rear loop and forward loops should be identical. This can only be accomplished by duplicating the rod's movement in both directions. Using a discarded length of rope or old fly line that is easily seen, place the pieces parallel to one another about 6 feet apart. Casting horizontally, keep the rod leg, the line closest to the rod, and the fly leg, the line closest to the fly inside the parallel guides. Have the rod tip just inside the line closest to you. Moving the one further from you closer will give you a guide to make your loops smaller. When you can keep your loops within the ropes when they are 2 or 3 feet apart with a longer line, you will have accomplished your goal of "tight" loops. Move the rod more vertical during the exercise to develop good loops in all casting planes.

Richard's coffee and donuts woke us up as we rigged rods, marked lines and prepared for a great morning of casting. Woody Miller, Ken Doty, Alan Sewell, Robert Fischer and CI Chris O'Bryne provided careful instruction to our members as they honed their skills before applying their new tricks to the local waters after a great lunch provided by our own Hays family. I want to not only thank our instructors, but also all who attended. I would like to have seen more newer members in attendance, but they will have an opportunity when we do another one in spring.

Some Fish Were Caught

As Alan said, fish were caught at the Nov. 19th afternoon outing, Woody Miller caught the first legal sized fish but Rick Warfel caught the largest. Here are Rick's comments in an email to Alan along with a picture of his 25" trout.

"Alan.

I had a great day fishing. I caught 7 trout and a big lizard fish that got me on the reel. Two of the trout were over the legal minimum. The first of

Just When You Thought It Was Safe To Go In The Cemetery by Martin Skelly

I was standing on a bank that slopes at a 45-degree angle. My shoulders were even with the land. I had taken a forward cast with my 3wt. rod when I noticed how quiet it was. Then from the far right field of my vision, I saw a huge duck coming in for a landing. I could hear his wings flapping, then silence. It reminded me of a huge Coast Guard plane coming in. For the moment, I forgot about fishing and was looking at the wildlife. I was looking at the duck when I heard a different noise.

My rod was at 12 o'clock. My fly line was gone and I was into my backing. I looked at the reel

in my right hand and then I looked out to the water. I didn't see my line, but when I looked at my reel the backing was still going out! Then I realized my rod was bent backwards. My fly line was on land and leaving fast. I got up on the bank just in time to see a squirrel running up a tree with my fly.

I flipped the tip of the rod and hooked the squirrel in foot (not on purpose). This was where it really got bad. The squirrel fell out of the tree and had an ATTITUDE. He tried to run back to the tree, and I flicked him down again. He charged me! I was reeling as fast as I could on my 3wt. I have only seen one other animal this mad. It was in New Orleans and it was an organ grinder's monkey when someone took his tin can away from him.

Back to the squirrel from hell. As he charged, I ran and stood behind a headstone. He took one huge leap and landed on the headstone in front of me. I jumped back and fell. It didn't take long for me to stand upright, and I realized all my slack was in. The only thing holding him back was a 5-foot 3wt. rod. I knew better than to try to reason with a squirrel that was hooked. I walked him two to three hundred yards over to the truck. As I opened the truck door and reached for a blanket, I found out one more thing: Never turn your eyes or back on a hooked squirrel. To make a long story short, I covered him with the blanket and he calmed down enough to pull the barbless hook out him. I am guessing he was about a pound and a half, because there is no way I could unroll him to measure how long he was. I never did see that duck land!

PS ...I also went deep sea fishing, on Saturday and got a nice grouper, but it was out of season so had to release it.

It was a treat to receive an email from former SFF member and Past President Martin Skelly with this entertaining account of his recent fishing excursion. His adventures in cemeteries, on golf courses and other unusual fishing destinations were always fun to read and this one is no exception. I know Martin slipped over to the dark side for the grouper, but what the heck, it was a nice fish......Paul

Tying Bench — Green and Gold

Our December outing is officially called the Don Coleman Classic. It is our annual tribute to our dear departed and much missed friend and former member Don Coleman. Don generously devoted his time and considerable skills to teaching new fly fishers how to tie flies and cast with a fly rod. Don's love of everything associated with fly fishing was only exceeded by his love for people and passing on his vast knowledge to whom ever wanted to learn. We all miss Don's smiling face and good nature. I thought this month it would be good to lift a page out of Don's book "Random Thoughts From The Tying Bench" and publish Don's comments and directions for tying one of his favorite flies.PS



The Green and Gold by Don Coleman

THE GREEN AND GOLD -- This wonderful bendback pattern was developed by Leigh West of the Tampa Bay Fly Fishing Club. Leigh usually ties this pattern on a 2/0 standard length saltwater hook. Here are Leigh's own words, "This fly is easy to tie and it's virtually weedless and maintenance free. It doesn't resemble any type of baitfish, and is a more subdued attractor pattern. It just happens to look right in place over the grass flats and yellow sand pot holes in our area. The Flashabou sides give the fly a lot of flash and movement, even when worked slowly. This fly works well on redfish, snook, and trout. Scale down the proportions and hook size for winter/clear water situations and for tailing redfish." Leigh considers it an alternative to a gold spoon. It is tied as a bendback with all of the components of the wing tied in immediately behind the hook eye. Here is how to tie Leigh's Green and Gold:

Materials:

Hook: Mustad 3407 or similar size 2/0

Thread: Brown 3/0

• Body: Gold Flashabou over wrapped with clear vinyl rib

• Wing: alternate bands of olive deer tail and gold Flashabou

Directions:

1. Debarb and sharpen and bend the hook.

- 2. Then wrap on a gold flashabou body and over wrap with vinyl rib or 20 pound clear monofilament.
- 3. Wing the fly with alternating layers of gold flashabou and soft brown or olive bucktail. Use two sparse layers of bucktail with the first layer being 1 1/3 times the hook length and the second layer 1 2/3 times the hook length.
- 4. Top the fly with a generous (as large as preceding layers combined) amount of peacock herl twice the length of the hook.
- 5. Tie in lateral lines with several strands of gold flashabou.
- 6. Then build a brown thread head and whip finish.





Federation of Fly Fishers (FFF) and Suncoast Fly Fishers (SFF) Dues

At initial membership dues are collected for both SFF and FFF. Since we (SFF) are a Charter member of FFF, all SFF members have to be members of FFF. 
Wading The Saltwater Flats With A Fly Rod and Random Thoughts From The Tying Bench By Don Coleman


