Casting tips by Capt. Pat Damico, MCI

Casting tip # 15 - How can I safely cast when the wind is blowing toward my casting side?

This situation is a frequent problem and one that causes most accidents with getting "hooked." The simple answer is to keep the fly and fly line away from the caster. In a mild wind, casting horizontally and close to the water's surface will keep the fly at least a rod length away. You can make your usual vertical cast only tilt your rod so that the rod tip travels over your opposite shoulder. Tilt your body away from the wind and "Brush your hair," with your rod hand keeping the rod tip on the downwind side. Cast on the downwind side by having your casting hand cross your chest. This allows a convenient stop for the rod on your backcast but will limit distance. Turn around and cast behind you and deliver your backcast to the target turning your wrist away from you as you deliver the cast. By far the best method is to learn to cast with the opposite hand.

Capt. Ray Markham. Spring Redfish Strategies by Bill AuCoin

Spring has sprung, sort of, so where are the redfish?

Capt. Ray Markham told about the time he took some guys fishing and they caught lots of reds, trout and snook. A couple of days later he got a call from one of the guys who fessed up. He said he fished every one of Ray's secret "spots" and he asked Ray how come they couldn't catch any fish there when they had non-stop action in Ray's flats boat the day before?

Markham didn't tell that guy but he told Suncoast Fly Fishers at the February meeting that the reason that fish are not always where they were the day before is that conditions vary from day to day. Wind direction and velocity also help determine water levels and where the baitfish are holding. Barometric pressure, cloud cover, water temperature, turbidity, and water color are other variables. Any combination, even one factor, could influence fish to move.

If the tide is not right, the redfish may not be where they are "supposed" to be. Or, sometimes the tide will be moving but the depth is wrong because a south wind has pushed water into the area. Or, maybe the current and water level are just right but that school of 100 redfish is nowhere to be seen. What's different?

Pay attention to conditions

When you catch fish, take note of the conditions and that will tell where why and where the fish are "supposed" to be in the future. It's an inexact science, for sure, but better than nothing.

Ray revisits his productive spots two weeks later when, with moon's help, tide stages and currents are more likely to be the same.

Markham said his favorite book for planning fishing trips is The Florida Sportsman Fishing Planner. A new volume comes out each year and provides month-by-month tide charts and the maximum flow times throughout Florida.

'It's not about spots. It's about the level of the tides," he said. Plan to fish a series of redfish locations, arriving there just before the main push of current.

But even if water levels and tide stages are perfect, Markham said, be aware that s_t happens. Like, maybe a crotch rocket screams by and the jockey is oblivious to the fact that you're fishing and he's breaking the law running in a no-motor zone, or that he's too close to a shore line or in a go-slow manatee zone.

Markham would not name any names but he said one time he had been patiently stalking a school of redfish for an hour. He got a nice red on the line, but a tower boat captain saw his bent rod and called in seven more tower boats to fish his spot.

We feel your pain, Capt. Ray Markham. You can vent at Suncoast Fly Fishers anytime

Tide. Temperature. Flow.

Heaven on earth to Markham in cool weather is a spring tide that bottoms out at a negative point five and is set to pour in. You're already in position, ready to cast to a skinny water spot with a dark bottom that has been exposed to the sun. Quickly rising water temperature on a cool day gets reds feeding.

Another useful tool is a water temperature gauge in both hot and cold extremes. If most of the water is 64 degrees and they're not biting, look for 68-degree water and they probably will be biting. Fish metabolic

rates are governed by water temperature. When their metabolism speeds up, as it does in warmer water, they will be more likely to eat.

On a cold day Markham goes to some places he knows that are sheltered from the winds and waves and have a little water, warmed by an all-day sun. Reds will be there, their backs out of the water, catching the warmth of the sun.

Equipment is important, certainly.

Having fished with his dad's and grandpa's fly tackle from the ripe old age of four, Ray spotted a store deal he finally couldn't pass up. Markham held up his first fly rod and reel -- an old glass rod with a Pfleuger Medalist reel purchased circa 1966 at a going out of business sale for the hefty sum of \$7. It was just right for a coming-of-age boy in Florida casting black foam spiders for bass and bluegill on Chassahowitzka and Withlacoochee Rivers on weekends. That's the rod that brought him into the fly fisher fold.

These days, stalking redfish, Markham usually holds an 8-weight Loomis GLX Cross Current rod in one hand and pinches a fly in the fingers of the other. Sometimes it's a chartreuse/white Clouser, sometimes a spoon fly like the tiny Rex spoon, and sometimes a bonefish fly on a #4 hook.

Ready when you are, Mr. Redfish.

The 6:30 fly tying demonstration session prior to the meeting is a very popular feature. Members are always interested in new flies, different methods of tying old flies or just some well known fly that might not have been demonstrated in a while. Old tried and true patterns are new to new fly fishers and are very interesting to them. We need members who are willing to share their fly tying skills with their fellow members. Tying Bench - Pat's One-step Baitfish By Pat Damico

Synthetic material is durable, versatile and very easy to use. This pattern simplifies the process and allows for modification, expansion and creativity. The amount of time needed for most patterns is greatly reduced. A variety of materials can be used once the principles are understood and applied.

Materials:

- Mustad C68SZ size 6 to 1/0 hook
- Monofil clear .004 or .006 thread
- EP Fibers, EP Sparkle, Pearl Wing N' Flash
- Hologram Dome eyes
- Dave's Flexament, Hard as Nails and Fletch Tite cement
- Permanent markers and pens

Tying Instructions:

1. Mount hook in vise and begin to secure thread close to hook eye with jam knot

- 2. Take about 15 EP Fibers, a little less of Sparkle and Wing N' Flash, the amount will be the most difficult to determine at first. Mix the strands depending on how much flash you want in the fly.
- 3. Fold them in half, and in half again. Hold them in the middle and using a scissors cut the bent over strands on each end as you hold them in the middle
- 4. Tease the strands on the tail side of the fly to shape a minnow's body, longer in the center and hold over hook to determine pattern length
- 5. Holding the fibers on top of the hook, secure with several wraps of thread allowing the fibers to cover the upper half of hook shank. Make a few more wraps of thread. Comb fibers toward tail to break any that are bent or use scissors tip to help
- 6. Fibers that are sticking out on eye side of hook are now taken and pointed at tail as you hold them over first wrap but allow some of fibers to cover lower half of hook too. They should expose hook eye and allow thread to now wrap over all fibers to form a nice head.
- 7. Comb all fibers toward tail to finish shape of pattern. Inspect fly to make sure there aren't any bare spots. If there are, fibers picked up on comb can be tied in and bent back before final head shaping.
- 8. Baitfish shape should be complete. Whip finish and coat head with head cement.
- 9. Use markers to produce desired colors, starting with lightest and finishing with darkest for baitfish back
- 10. Apply drop of Fletch Tite on each side for eye placement. A needle can transfer Hologram eyes to desired location
- 11. Place point of open tweezers on each eye and squeeze together for 10 seconds allowing proper shape of head. Later coat head and front part of fly with Sally Hansen's Hard as Nails

Try other synthetic material with this technique.

Big Flies—Only Good For Saltwater? By Paul Sequira

Pat Damico came up with a very innovative method for tying his One-Step Baitfish pattern by securing all the material needed for the fly on the hook in one step — hence the name (see page 9). Although this pattern creates the type of fly that we typically use for saltwater fishing, it can certainly be effective in fresh water too.

Case in point — last month we fished the newly renovated and recently reopened Jigg's Landing on the Braden River, now a Manatee County Park. As Alan mentioned in his Outing Report, the fishing was slow for some of us but fish were caught. In fact Joe Dail caught a 97/8 inch blue gill which qualifies as the winning sunfish in our annual contest.

Ted Rich and I were fishing the perimeter of a large section of lily pads; as we worked our way around them, we eventually caught up with Mark Hays. Mark had noticed several pelicans diving into and feeding on schools of baitfish being driven up to the surface by a school of sunshine bass.

The baitfish were clearly visible to Mark and what he noticed was that Pat's One-Step Baitfish was an excellent imitation of the bait being slaughtered by the sunshine bass. Not only that, but Mark felt that there were more than likely largemouth bass under the school of sunshines, picking up the wounded and crippled baitfish. We tried everything in our fly boxes but I guess we just didn't have anything closely resembling that bait. These fish wanted meat! Had we been ready with some of these, or similar flies, we would have had a banner day with some terrific action. In the accompanying picture, Brad Lowman is holding a

beautiful sunshine bass he caught (I don't know where he was fishing but maybe he'll tell us in his presentation at this month's meeting) on a fly Brad ties that is similar to Pat's pattern featured in this month's Tying Bench. So maybe we should include a few of our saltwater baitfish patterns in our freshwater boxes along with all those poppers and foam spiders; I know I will from now on.

Note: There are many fly patterns that could prove to be useful in a situation such as described above and you will find some good ones in the archives of "On The Fly". Just go to SFF's website <u>www.suncoastflyfishers.com</u> and click on the "Fly Tying" link. Some patterns that would work are: Snake Fly (8-06), Clouser Floating Minnow (10-06), Poly-Whitebait Fly (5-07), Pat's Bead Butt Baitfish (1-08), Poly-Hi-Tie (12-08), Bend Back - if tied large and full enough (3-09), Polarfibre Minnow (4-09), Schminnow (6-09), Lowman's Lucky Fly (12-10). There are many more patterns, the fun is in searching them out, tying a few and trying them.

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




