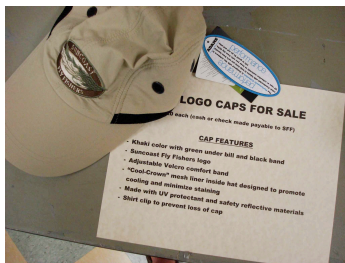
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News 'n' Notes

Meet Our August Meeting Speaker

"The Comatose Angler" -- Nick Colantonio

Following a tour of duty in the Navy and a 35-year career in chemical engineering, Nick retired to pursue redfish, snook and trout on the flats of Tampa Bay. Fish populations are safe.



Nick Colantonio, aka "The Comatose Angler" because of slow reaction times, is our August meeting speaker. From the looks of it, slow reaction to a fish strike is a good thing.

Nick is known as THE Comatose Angler in Florida, Alaska, and Ireland. The moniker was bestowed on him by a fellow fly club member in recognition of his notoriously slow hook set. A guide in Clare County, Ireland commented "Nick, your reaction times are brutal". Today an award at Alaska's Goodnews River Lodge is presented in honor of The Comatose Angler.

In December, 2013, Nick participated in the inaugural IRL Paddle Adventure - paddling his 17-foot Grumman canoe the length of the Indian River Lagoon, from New Smyrna Beach to Jupiter - -a distance of over 150 miles. The trip was organized as a fund-raiser for the Marine Resources Council, with the intention of highlighting the beauty of the lagoon system and the very real problems that threaten its viability.

Nick will discuss the 19-day adventure and the lessons he learned on his first ever canoe camping trip. Lacking any fast twitch muscle fiber, he has ridden drag on cattle drives in North Dakota.

"I thought I would paddle the sweep canoe. Turns out I was not the Sweeper, but the Sweepee".

When not casting and retrieving, Nick devotes his time to the study of the Great Highland Pipes of Scotland and visiting a hospital and senior centers with his registered therapy dog, Sadie.

Capt. Ethan Kiburz: Insights for Tarpon on a Fly

Captain Ethan Kiburz was our June meeting speaker and he was telling us what a huge tarpon season it has been.

He said that just about every morning he has been quietly maneuvering his flats boat to the clear Gulf waters just outside the swim markers at Caladesi and Honeymoon Island State Parks. He gets his client squared away on the casting deck. He climbs up on his poling platform. The rising sun helps Ethan see into the clear water. There's one. There's another. A few hours later when they return to the launching ramp he has seen maybe a thousand tarpon. Yeah.

Where is the easy part. Where is anywhere along the 35 miles of Gulf beach from Tarpon Key to Mullet Key or maybe Anna Maria Island. You don't need to go to Boca Grande, you know. There are more tarpon in the St. Petersburg-Clearwater area and all those tarpon anglers aren't right on top of each other.

The HOW is tougher. Equipment must be tough, too.

Boatside Lifting Power

Use a 12 weight rod. Oh, sure, you can fight 'em on 10 and 11 weight rods but you'll have trouble pulling a tarpon close enough for the guide to grab the leader. And to put the most pressure on a tarpon, do not hold the rod up high. Keep it pointed at the horizon and then you get to use the backbone of the rod to put on the most pressure. Keep the rod low to the water so you can always be ready to do the down and dirty on the stubborn ones. Tarpon don't like to get near boats, you know.



Seaducers Galore -- And you can't buy any. Ethan ties them for Ethan. He tied some more at the June meeting.



Purple is his go-to color. And if that ain't working, Ethan switches to tan. Then yellow. He ties it on a 1/0 Gamakatsu SL 12 J hook.

Continued...Capt. Ethan Kiburz: Tarpon Insights

His leader is not your father's leader. It's two seven-foot lengths of 50-pound fluorocarbon joined by a double uni-knot. Ethan said he's not worried about losing his fly line to a line-spooling tarpon because the leader knot or the knot to the fly will break before the leader line. Casts aren't long; 50-feet is about right. He often tells clients to throw for a longer cast so they can pull back on the shooting line so the long leader lays out straight.

He starts tarpon fishing in May. The water temperatures are not as warm as they will be so often tarpon are deeper. But by June and especially July they are quite comfortable in 4-6 feet of water. He continues to fish through August. June is best.

In all cases he goes with floating line. In the early part of the season when the water's cold he'll use floating line with a sink tip. When the water warms he prefers the line to float all the way to the leader. "If you need to fish a little deeper you can let the sinking Fluorocarbon take the fly down deeper if you need it deeper," he said. He likes Orvis Hydro floating line with a blue color that he can see looking down but, hopefully, the tarpon can't see looking up.

And these...

- To get their attention make the fly breathe with short tick strips. Then when you've got their attention, turn on their predator instinct with a mix of shorter and longer strips.
- If the tarpon tries to come up for air. Don't let it. Pull it down.
- If the tarpon goes right, pull left and down. If it goes left, pull right and down.
- Watch the fly, not the fish.

At the PHWFF Bradenton Yacht Club outing for vets, guides, and volunteers it was a female guide, *Captain Rachel Nobbe-Cato* who successfully led vet Al Mitchell and volunteer Richard Oldenski to catch snook up to 26 inches. (On the same morning, SFF outing fellows had a good lunch and griped about the wind and the fish not hitting that day.)

Just in case you are feeling a bit intimidated, remember that *Wanda Taylor* (IFFF Certified Master Caster) will be at the IFFF Expo in October to further your education. In addition to speaking, she's also doing special sessions for women--so they can keep going first in our outings and tournaments

For a bit of historical perspective, it is noted that *Dame Juliana Berners*, the prioress of the Benedictine nunnery of Sopwell, near St. Albans, wrote in 1496 how to build a rod (staffe) with butt section made from a piece of green "hasyll, willowe, or ashe." Tip on this 15-foot rod was to be made

from Hazel, "black thornn, crab tree . . . or juniper." She tried to "match the hatch" and developed a set of twelve fly patterns, one for each month of the year. (Angler's Club of New York has a set of these flies

mounted on parchment). She started an economic revolution with that. (*Larry Koller, Treasury of Angling, pp. 14-16.*)

Suncoast Fly Fishers Teach Kids How to Cast a Fly

Suncoast Fly Fishers are teaching fly casting to youth from nine to 14 years of age at E. G. Simmons Fishing Camp, Ruskin, Florida. This is a report of the first two sessions -- June 23 and July 1. The next two are July 18 and August 4. With practice, boys and girls graduate from PVC practice pipes and paint brush drills to real fly rods.

Camp Director Dave Ramirez and his staff organized the kids and helped with managing the group. The kids had plenty of energy and several had some experience with fly casting. We had many more girls this year than we had last year.

Suncoast Fly Fishers demonstrated casting but most of the time we worked by giving them suggestions and occasionally had them practice the cast with the PVC pipe. It was a good transition from the pipes and paint brushes to the short Form rods. The 8'6" rods were good size for even the shortest kid.

Even though we shortened the leader to four-feet there were many "wind knots" even in the fly line. Most of them could hit the targets and modified their cast to increase the chances of hitting the target. The older group showed a greater interest in fly casting and several remained after the session for additional casting. Many had questions about fly fishing and sources for fly fishing equipment.

Set up: Casting course 100' X 30', 10 stations 10' apart. Targets = 33" diameter hula hoops, 14" and 24" diameter pot dishes, and 4'V stakes.. Targets at 20'and 30'

Instruction

- Discussed differences between spin casting and fly casting.
- Explained and demonstrated casting stroke
- Demonstrated stroke and practiced with 0.5" diameter 2 foot length PVC pipe Called out forward cast "splash the paint" and back cast "pick up the phone"
- Practiced splashing water with a paint brush. Great suggestion by Dayle Mazzarella and see "On the Fly" March, 2014.
- Divided into two groups and paired up.
- Assigned casting lanes to each pair.
- Demonstrated and practiced with Form rods (50" rods with no reel; line shortened to 20 feet).
- Demonstrated and practiced with 8' 6" rods and reels (shortened leader to 4').
- Target practice to pot dishes, hula hoops and V stakes.
- Each youth received SFF Youth Fly Casting certificate.

When did you join Suncoast Fly Fishers? I was a founding member along with Rick Redd, Jim Stewart, Jack O'Connell and others.

What is your favorite game fish to catch on a fly, and why? Bonefish – They live in a beautiful environment, they have to be stalked carefully and they make very strong runs. Dolphin – They are the most beautiful fish you can catch, they are all sight fished, they jump a lot, fight hard and they are great to eat. Plus sometimes they can be dumb as a bunch of rocks.

What are your top three places to fly fish?

1. North Andros Island- the Joulter Cays – you can have a religious experience here- I thought I had died and gone to heaven.
2. Marathon Key- this is the gateway to great dolphin fishing, plus tarpon, bonefish, barracuda and yellowtails. Been going there for 20 years.
3. Exumas, Bahamas- the Peace and Plenty Lodge holds many wonderful memories for me. It's probably

the best place for your first bonefish trip. Lots of willing small fish in paradise.

What is your go-to fly rod and reel? A 7-weight Loomis GLX and Scientific Angler's System II reel handle about 90% of my inshore fishing. But I recently threw the Sage Method rod and it could become my favorite, I was very impressed.

How and when did you get introduced to fly fishing? As a kid I read Outdoor Life magazine and watched Curt Gowdy on TV's "Flying Fisherman" show about 1958. So I saved up money from cutting grass and bought an Eagle Claw rod from Montgomery Wards. I used it to catch snappers and jacks from the sea walls in Miami and bass and blue gills in the St. Johns River in Jacksonville.

Why do you like fly fishing compared to fishing with conventional tackle? It's more aesthetic and artistic. There is more to fishing than just racking up body counts.

Do you tie flies? What flies do you like to tie? Yes. I like the spoon fly, Clousers tied like Gotchas, Leigh West's Green and Gold and of course the Golden Eye Shrimp.

Capt. Pat Damico: Fly Casting Clinic. Tip # 55

Many new fly fishing enthusiasts have had their first success trout fishing with a floating strike indicator and a weighted nymph or 2 on the end of their tippet. If in a drift boat, they can lower the "rig" into the water and watch the "bobber" for some hesitation indicating a take. The guide will maneuver the boat allowing the offering to be in the most fishy locations and often will call out, "Lift or strike," and the sport will raise the rod tip and yell, "Fish on!" True, this is a very effective form of fly fishing not even requiring a cast for success.

If wading, a cast is made upstream with a very short line. This is more of a lob to position the rig so that the offerings drift without drag close to the bottom. After the "cast" the rod is held almost vertically keeping the fly line off the water to assist in eliminating drag, following the

indicator downstream, referred to as, "high sticking." If this has been your introduction to fly fishing it will not prepare you for 98% of what fly fishing is all about. Time for lessons!

Mazzarella: Grass Drill # 5: Feeding Line Drill

GOALS: Pick up 25-ft of line and feed to 45-ft. of line.
(Use Pick Up and Lay Down Drill to start.)

Principles: No slack, straight line rod tip path, constant acceleration, pause or timing, arc and stroke match line length.

STEP 1 : Place yarn at 25-ft. Rod tip down. Line straight. 20-ft. of line stripped off the reel and coiled on the ground.

STEP 2 : Execute pick up and false cast a few times, keeping your line hand on the line.

STEP 3: After a forward cast and stop, let the line go with your line hand.

STEP 4 : After a few feet of line has moved through your guides, clamp down on the line again. By now the line should be straight in front.

STEP 5: Now it's time to start your back cast. When first learning, you can take a few more casts before again feeding line on the forward stroke. Continue until all line is off the ground.

Trouble shooting:

1. Line does not shoot, or dies in a pile on the forward cast.

- a) The line was released too early
- b) Not enough power on the forward cast.
- c) Back cast did not straighten before forward cast was initiated (too much slack).
- d) Line was released too late.

STEP 6 : Work at feeding more line with fewer false casts.

STEP 7: Work at feeding line on forward and back casts.

Want a Challenge?

Step 8 : Starting with your fly at 25-ft see how much line you can shoot in three false casts.

NOTE: Feeding and shooting line efficiently is a prerequisite to "Quick Casting" to moving fish. It also allows the angler to spend more time with the fly in the water. (Not a whole lot of fish in the air!) It also prevents fatigue and helps to reduce spooking fish.

Are purple flies the next big thing?

Are purple flies becoming a big thing? Several people seem to like them, including two tying instructors that I know of, plus our speaker last month. This could be a good thing. I like Smitty's purple Tarpon Toad in smaller sizes for inshore fishing. Try some purple, and let me know what happens.

Flies that swim on their side

Here's an idea. Wounded or impaired baitfish tend to lose their equilibrium and lie on their sides while they struggle to right themselves. This behavior attracts the attention of predator fish. So, I am tying some patterns with the eyes on the bottom and on the top to simulate a baitfish on its side, with one eye looking downward, the other eye upward. Testing these flies should be fun. I'll let you know of my success, or the lack of it.

Summer drum

I hear that black drum are feeding on blue crabs around the bridge pilings and under the bridges in upper Tampa Bay. Maybe it's time to get out those crab patterns that we put away last spring. Then too, smaller blacks are supposed to be pretty fair eating. Blacks' size limit is 14 to 24 inches, limit 5 per day, and one fish may be over 24 inches.

Find sea trout in deeper water

Sea trout are moving into four- to six-foot water depths in search of temperatures that are cooler than the nearly ninety degrees that they are finding at the surface. Try a sinking line as well as some weighted flies to get to these fish. The sinking line should help you to make a smoother and more realistic retrieve.

What if a tarpon hits your snook fly?

Inshore predator fish are currently hunting shrimp and baitfish in the surf along the beaches. Work the passes on outgoing tides anytime, and on incoming tides in the morning, the earlier the better. Heavier leader tippets up to 50-pound test are in order, what with some good-sized tarpon patrolling the beaches as well the smaller fish.

Roll cast your way out of dock snag trouble

Docklight fishing at night is improving, but you need to be very, very quiet in your approach. Fish in these confined and shallow areas are very sensitive to any bumping noises that you might make in your boat, as well as loud voices. Finally, if you get a fly stuck on a dock, try a roll cast, which just might dislodge the fly by reversing the direction of the hook to twist it free. It worked for me.

Sneak up on 'em, and good luck!
