### September 20, 2014 - Chassahowitzka River

This outing has always been one of our favorite trips. We will be fishing on the spring side of the river. The Chas is spring-fed river for the first three miles until it reaches the Gulf and turns into vast, shallow marshes. Five miles offshore it will be five feet deep. This is one outing all members should try to attend. The view is outstanding on the river, which has many side tributaries leading off to springs. We will be fishing for the largest sunfish and largest bass in this crystal clear water.

# Nick Colantonio: Indian River Lagoon Needs Help



Nick Colantonio, a member of the Tampa Bay Fly Fishing Club, told us about the Dec. 2013 IRL adventure at the August meeting. There's room in the bow for the 2014 expedition in December.

Less than a year ago Nick Colantonio packed his Grumman to the gunwales and paddled from the top of the Indian River Lagoon at New Smyrna Beach to the bottom at Jupiter. Whew.

That's 19 days of paddling more than 150 miles on the map but many more miles than that in a canoe whipped off course by wind's whims. It's an excruciatingly long way for of a single paddler of a certain age in a canoe with a month's worth of camping gear, coolers and grill, including a 20-gallon propane tank.

He joined about a dozen others on this

December 2013 IRL Paddle Adventure. Now, with images and I've-been-there experience they are telling potential allies that the IRL is still beautiful but it's in trouble. Colantonio asked for Suncoast Fly Fishers to join the effort to rescue the IRL from environmental woes that have gotten much worse just in the last two years.

Manatees and resident populations of 300 dolphins are dying off.

Water quality is awful. Rapid population increases and polluted water runoff have led to huge blooms of algae. Blooms and dirty water have destroyed mile after square miles of seagrass, The IRL is hurting like Tampa Bay on Florida's west coast was hurting back in the 1970s and 1980s. Nick said the organization in the best position to lead the renewal is the Marine Resources Council with ten scientists and more than 800 citizen volunteers.

### Alan Sewell: 38-inch dock light snook

### Here's Alan's blow-by-blow on that huge July dock light snook

This is a recap of our July night fishing outing. The weather was perfect. No wind, smooth seas, fair tide movement. It was the best night to fish from the beaches, passes or bridges, boats, or even kayaks.

Many fish were caught, including snook, trout, redfish, ladyfish and catfish. Yes, catfish will hit a fly around the dock lights. They fight hard, but then you have to release them. Anyway, this is about snook, and I can tell the story, because the snook that I caught was the largest snook ever caught in our outings, and also the largest fish ever entered in our yearly tournaments.

Truk was my partner and we guessed the snook to be 38-inches. I only had a 36-inch ruler, and the fish was many inches longer but we settled on 38-inches just to get the fish back in the water alive. I normally fish dock lights by first watching for movement, like shrimp jumping, minnows scattering, fish feeding. Since you can see the fish in the lights, I usually call this sight fishing. If I don't see any of these signs, I move to the next light. Now for the story. I always like to warm-up at a dock, just to get my distance memorized, and to show my partner how we are going to fish the rest of the night.

Within five minutes of launching my boat, I stopped at the first light to practice. This was a big dock with boats hanging and outside poles maybe 20 feet from the end. My fly was my Sili-Leg Shrimp pattern in white, tied on my favorite hook, a Mustad C71SSS, #1. This is a circle streamer hook, which is 2XH/1XL.

I did not see a fish on this dock because this was for practice, remember. The first practice cast I made was slammed by a heavy fish, which I missed because I raised my rod and the circle hook did not set. Since I figured out that there was a fish there I cast again and the same fish slammed it again. I pulled back on the line so the hook would set and the water erupted with the snook jumping clear out of the water.

I was between the dock and the outside poles and I could not even pull the fish out with the trolling motor. I tried three times to move the fish outside, but it kept turning back to the dock. My hand was burned several times with the line rushing across my fingers. I will say that this was an epic battle.

Every time I got the fish to the boat, it swam back under the dock. I was using a 30-lb base furled leader with 40-lb tippet, so I knew that the leader was strong enough to pull. I was using a rod that was made for this purpose, a Redington *Predator* 10 wt that is 7' 8" and made to throw big flies and pull fish out of lilypads, mangroves or pilings. This style of rods is made in 8-, 9-, or 10-wt. Sage has the *BASS II*, White River has the *Heat*, and Temple Fork Outfitter has *Hawgleg*.

Now back to the fish. It was proven that night that a 40-inch fish will not fit in a 30-inch net. I could not land the fish and keep pressure on it. I dragged the fish to Truk and he was able to lift it aboard to measure it so we could get it back in the water, alive. The fish was weak, but it did swim away, which was better than the catch. Thanks, Truk.

Now 30 minutes have gone by since I launched the boat, and I wanted to quit fishing. But we did keep fishing and caught trout, redfish and ladyfish the rest of the night. I did have to change the leader because the 40-lb tippet was almost worn through.  $\mathcal{Al}$

# Andy Constantinou: Carp Secrets from England

# Something a little different, writes Andy. Yep!

Andy Constantinou goes to England to escape Florida's summer heat. But he doesn't stop fishing. Carp is on the menu, so to speak. He and his friend John drive about an hour to Manor Farm Fishery near Biggleswade and pay £10 a day to fish there and it is strictly catch and release. (So, just to be clear, carp are actually not on the menu.)

The specially designed catapult is used to get the dog biscuits within casting distance of the fish. When they start to eat the pellets the fly is cast amongst them. In hot weather the carp cruise near the surface so it's like sight fishing.

After the fish takes the fly it's advisable to wait for the line to run before lifting the rod, otherwise the fly is pulled out of the fish's mouth and you lose the fish.

I was wondering if this method would work with tilapia and mullet. I plan to give it a try when I return to Florida in September.



### David Putnam: Snook on the Beach

Sam scooped my big one out of the surf for me. He couldn't operate the camera, and I was stuck with this one of him holding my biggest, estimated by him at 22 lbs, which means that if it had been his fish the estimate would have been higher. My first guess was 25 lbs, but I'm not that good at estimates.

Anyway, one nice fly rod fish. 9 wt, Clouser-style white fly with green back, tied on size 2 hook.

I got there at 6 am, took a ten-minute break at around ten, and then went back to battle. I came in, finally, exhausted.

I landed six snook on the fly. Weights: I8, 15,15,13, 14 and 6 lbs. Lost a few others, naturally. My buddy got one around 28-

30 lbs. Wildest ever. David

# Layne (Smitty) Smith: One Large Gummy Minnow fly

A couple of months ago, I was having a discussion with Tom Jones about his Gummy Minnow flies. It intrigued me to the point of giving it a try on the vise.

Well you know me. I couldn't leave well enough alone. So I have tied it in a LARGER version. Let me know how it works for you on the water. You'll need your heaviest fly rod to throw it.

Dave Ramirez, Camp Director and his staff organized the kids and helped with managing the group. The kids had plenty of energy and several had some experience with fly casting. We had many more girls this year than we had last year. We demonstrated casting but most of the time they were casting. The workouts with the PCV pipe and paint brush drills stressed casting form. It was a good transition from the pipes and paint brushes to the short Form rods. The 8'6" rods were good size for even the shortest kid. Even though we



shortened the leader to 4' there were many "wind knots" even in the fly line. Most of them could hit the targets and modified their cast to increase the chances of hitting the target. The older group showed a greater interest in fly casting and several remained after the session for additional casting. Many had questions about fly fishing and sources for fly fishing equipment. We had great fun and a very rewarding experience sharing our fly fishing enthusiasm so much so that we hardly felt the 90 degree sun. Splashing each other during the water and paint brush drill also helped. The last session had several of the older youths who had been to last year's sessions or the one we had earlier this year and they showed remarkable casting skills. Each youth received a SFF Junior Training Clinic for Fly Casting Certificate.

### Capt. Pat Damico: Fly Casting Clinic. Tip # 56

### Follow the reel with your line hand

A frequent problem with some long time fly fishers is that while false casting and especially when making a final delivery of the fly, the line ends up behind the reel seat. Bending the wrist while casting creates a large opening between the wrist and reel seat. Having the line hand low and against your body places the line in this opening. Following the reel with your line hand especially on the backcast will eliminate this problem and immediately improve your casting by also getting rid of slack line between your stripping guide and line hand. Remember, slack in any cast is detrimental.

### Mazzarella: Grass Drill # 6: Roll Cast Drill

### Dayle Mazzarella, Master Casting Instructor

GOALS: Cast 35ft. off either shoulder.

PRINCIPLES: No slack, straight rod tip path, constant acceleration, arc and stroke match line length.

STEP 1:Strip 35ft. of line off rod.

STEP 2: Place an anchor at 18ft.

STEP 3: Place your yarn in or under the anchor.

STEP 4: Point your rod tip at the anchor and move it to 20 degrees or so to the outside. (Tip down)

STEP 5: With a straight wrist, slowly lift your rod to 12:00. At this point you should have your line coming off the ground about even with your feet or a little behind you. If it is coming off the ground in front of you, move forward. If you still have lots of slack, move back. This is now your starting point. You have created a "D" Loop.

STEP 6: Check your hand and wrist. Hand should be about even with your eyes. Now cock your wrist back a few degrees so your rod is at about 1:30.

STEP 7: Check your alignment with the target. The most efficient cast will be aimed in a straight line slightly to the side of your fly line.

STEP 8 Execute a forward cast. Remember: 1) Constantly apply acceleration. (Recall the wet paint brush practice) 2) Keep your thumb scraping the ceiling. (Straight line rod tip path) 3) Wait to rotate your wrist until the very end of your stroke. 4. STOP at about 10:30 o'clock.

STEP 9: Lower your rod and follow the line down.

### TROUBLESHOOTING:

- 1) Big Open Loop
  - a) Caused by too much arc (usually too much wrist) or
  - b) Too much power too early in the cast.

SOLUTION: Reduce the arc and concentrate on the paint brush

- 2) Line Dumps in a Pile
  - a) Caused by driving your rod tip too far down before the stop.

SOLUTION: Stop your rod tip higher

b) Not enough force applied.

SOLUTION: Apply more force, but make sure to apply the acceleration constantly over the length of your cast.

- 3) Line hits itself
  - a) Make sure to drive your rod to the side of your line, never over or across your line.
  - b) If the wind is from the side, you need to drive your rod to the downwind side of the line.

STEP 10: Repeat from opposite shoulder.

STEP 11: Want a challenge? Cast into the wind, longer casts, crosswind casts, headwind casts, etc.

# Bob Morrison: How-To



### Artists don't paint with toothpicks

I'm messin' with your head (cement). When I apply head cement I sometimes get too much, with a messy result that is difficult to clean up and often makes for a messy fly. Recently I got a tip to trim the cement applicator brush to a point, so that I can apply a smaller amount of cement to a smaller area. This way I can always add a little bit more if I need it, and have a cleaner, neater looking fly as a result.

**Spooky is as spooky does**. Here's a good one. It's not a good idea to cast a lead-eyed weighted fly to a tailing redfish, since the splash of the fly will spook fish in very shallow water. In such a situation the weight of the hook should be enough to get the fly down, and with less noise when it hits the water surface. A small winding of lead wire could also be helpful, and with less noise

**Save your leftovers**. When using Extra Select Craft Fur in fly tying, save the base fabric when all of the fur has been used up. This material can be used to make bodies for crabs, baby flounders, and other patterns. It can also be trimmed and colored to meet requirements.


**Paint like an artist**. When applying Fusion Cement in fly tying, try using a small artist's paintbrush instead of the usual toothpick. Wet the brush before using it to apply the Fusion and you will get a smoother result. The wet brush won't be a problem for the Fusion, which is waterbased. Thanks for this one go to Tom Jones.


