He returned to Maine in 1986 to help build the famed fly fishing instructional program at L.L. Bean's Outdoor Discovery Schools in Freeport, Since then, Macauley has become a world-renowned casting instructor and author of numerous books and articles for American Angler, Fly Fisherman, Saltwater Fly-Fishing, and other magazines. In 2011 the Federation of Fly Fishers awarded Macauley its Lifetime Achievement Award for his dedication to teaching and promoting fly-casting. Macauley will lead the casting session and introduce video recording to assist in analysis of your casting form. Video recording, although not a new technology, has now been adapted to smartphones, pads and tablets, adding a new dimension to improving our casting skills.

Member in the Spotlight

Myron Hansen: Member in the Spotlight



Hometown: Cumberland, Iowa

When did you join Suncoast Fly Fishers? I'm not sure of the year, but it was in the early 1990's.

What is your favorite game fish to catch on the fly and why? I guess I enjoy catching a large bluegill on the fly more than any other. Ounce for ounce they put up a great fight and I like using the light tackle. The scenery in the areas where they are caught is usually great and they are also my wife's favorite fish for dinner.

What are your top three places to fish?

- 1. Intracoastal dock lights
- 2. Lake Okeechobee (when the big bluegills are biting)
- 3. Any freshwater lake or river

What is your go-to fly rod and reel? Saltwater – Sage 7wt and a Hardy reel

Freshwater - G. Loomis 3wt and an Orvis reel

How and when did you get introduced to fly fishing? I actually first started really early on after reading about it in Boy's Life magazine. My dad had a fiberglass rod that was designed for a fly reel or spinning reel. My grandfather gave me an old automatic (spring loaded) fly reel. I bought some inexpensive fly line and caught a few bluegills in our farm pond with poppers. Then it was 25 or 30 years before I got interested in it again. Martin Skelly, who worked with my son's Boy Scout troop, told me about Carl and Ester's weekly get-togethers. I started going there and got involved.

Why do you like fly fishing compared to fishing with conventional tackle?

I guess I like everything about fly fishing. I like all the gear and I like being able to make my own flies. Sometimes I just enjoy the casting.

Tying Bench

Myron's Schminnow Tied by Myron Hansen



Myron Hansen's Schminnow

Eyes: Bead chain (size 1/8-medium)

Extra: Lead wire (size 020)

Fish this fly most anytime and anywhere in saltwater. I like it for night time dock light fishing which is my favorite time and place to fish.

Materials:

Hook:

Thread: Flat waxed Cement: Clear nail polish

Tail: Finnish raccoon Pearl crystal

flash

Body: Pearl chenille (size medium)

Tying Sequence

Step 1. I begin with a lead wrap of the hook, then a thread wrap, and then a coat of cement. The lead wrap adds some additional sink speed. I like the balance achieved by wrapping the hook shaft with lead rather than using heavy eyes.



Step 2. I create a tail using the Finnish raccoon and add sparkle with one or two pieces of crystal flash. Again the thread is coated with cement.



Step 3. The body is created by wrapping the hook shaft with the pearl chenille beginning where the tail was tied off and working forward. The chenille is tied off just before the hook eye. A little space is left for addition of the bead chain eyes. Again cement is added.



Step 4. The fly is completed by adding two bead chain eyes. The fly is tied off with a whip finish. All visible thread is then cemented.

Capt. Pat Damico: Fly Casting Clinic. Tip # 62

STOP STOP STOP

Why don't I get a good straight layout of my fly line when making my presentation cast? There are many reasons. A frequent one is to not have a proper stop at the end of both forward and back casts. When the length of fly line is the same, the forward and back cast should be identical in all respects, unless wind is a factor. Watching an experienced fly caster present a cast should look smooth. The forward stop is almost unperceivable, but must be there. Using the mantra, "Stop, Stop, and Drop," can be helpful. Lefty refers to this as a," Speed up and stop!"

Bob Morrison: How-To

Foul-hook a fowl?



- What do you do if you should hook a bird?
- 1. Protect your eyes with glasses or goggles if possible.
- 2. Get a partner to help you.
- 3. Wrap the bird in a towel or poncho. Cover the bird's head to calm it and to protect yourself from its beak. Tie or tape the beak, leaving it partly open so the bird can breathe. Tie the wings and legs if possible. With long-legged birds like herons and egrets, fold the legs before tying to reduce the danger of breaking them.
- 4. Unhook the bird, cutting off the barb and pulling out the remainder. Keep a pair of wire-cutting pliers for this purpose.
- 5. If the bird is a pelican, check the beak pouch for any tearing. Such injuries may require the attention of a veterinary. You can call a vet at 888-404-3922.
- 6. Release the bird to fly away on its own.
- 7. If you find a bird carcass, put it in a trash container. It may contain hooks, sinkers, or whatever.
- 8. Finally, try not to cast near birds.

Go get 'em, and Good Luck!

Dayle Mazzarella, MCI: Grass Drill # 11

[Editor's note: This is the final chapter of instruction in Master Casting Instructor Dayle Mazzarella's careful and comprehensive fly casting program. Thank you, Dayle, for sharing this with On The Fly and your fellow members of the Suncoast Fly Fishers. We are most grateful.]

DOUBLE HAUL DRILL

GOAL: Learn to double haul.

PURPOSE: Increase line speed, reduce work load on rod hand.

Fishing Application: Increased line speed makes it easier to cast under windy conditions, cast under obstructions, cast distance, and reduce fatigue over a long day of fishing.

PRINCIPLES: All previous principles.

SET UP: 75' rope with 7 cones, 1 at each end of the rope, place one cone in center of the rope, and 4 others near the center of the rope.

STEP 1: Assume student has mastered previous skills.

STEP 2: Find a partner who has also mastered those skills.

STEP 3: Assuming 2 right-handed casters, Partner A stands in the middle of the tape facing the tape with the fly line extended to 35' - 40' and the rod tip about 12" on the other side of the tape.

STEP 4: "A" performs Grass Drill B while Partner B places a cone where the rod stops on both the forward and the back cast. (Assuming the line is landing close to parallel to the tape or rope.)

STEP 5: "B" then places the 2nd pair of cones approximately 2 feet *inside* the stop/start cones.

STEP 6: "B" now stands to the left and slightly behind of Partner A. "B" takes the fly line with his/her *left* hand, about 2 feet below the stripping guide.

STEP 7: As "A" performs the line drill, "B" watches the rod tip. As it approaches the inside cone, "B" performs the "down-up" maneuver. The "down" should coincide with "A"'s "pop" or "snap" in the line drill.

STEP 8: Let the line sit. Straighten the line to remove slack and then repeat in the opposite direction.

STEP 9: When "B" is doing well with the timing, switch partners and repeat the process. **STEP 10:** Each partner does the entire drill by themselves. Go back to partner drill if problems


Troubleshooting:

occur.

- 1. The "down" should occur just about as the rod reaches maximum rod bend (near the inside cone). If the hauling partner doesn't feel the rod bend and/or the line doesn't straighten, it is because of a haul too late or too early. Watch the cone!!
- 2. If the line lands straight but the hauler hasn't performed the "up" portion of "down-up", then the hauler's hand will be 3 or 4 feet from the rod guide. If this happens, hauler, make sure to go "up"!



David Putnam: Fly Fisher Reflections

Houseguests

You'll have to listen to these tired old complaints: "I would miss the seasons down here, the changing leaves." He won't know how "you can stand the heat in September."

I stand September because of the fall runs of baitfish on Florida's east coast, when I'm knee deep in the surf pulling on big snook. The world's best bluegill fishing happens on the summer full moons. I wade then to keep cool, and wear one of those wide-brim, Florida Cracker hats. People *die* in Atlanta and Chicago heat waves every year.

He'll bring his flyrod, a 4-wt carrying a dried-out double- taper line, his "small stream rod." His wife won't wait long to offer her variation of, "He doesn't catch anything, but he loves it, standing there with his pals on the Amplegut River. *Please* show him how to fish."

January 17 Outing: Weedon Island -- If you look at a satellite picture of Pinellas County you'll note that almost every piece of land has a building on it. Almost. Two big green areas stand out. One is Fort DeSoto Park at the south end of the county. The other is the Weedon Island Preserve, a 3,000-acre expanse of mangrove forest shoreline and some of the best fishing opportunities in Tampa Bay. Anglers fish it by boat, kayak, from the pier, or wade in. Do some research online before you fish it during the January 17 outing. You can fish the grass flats

on the outside or dropoffs and holes on the inside. Tides bottom and peak about 45 minutes later than the times posted for the St. Pete Pier. (*Weedon Island Preserve*)
