### Rick Warfel: Lake Parrish, a Unique Fishing Opportunity

Lake Parrish is a large freshwater lake that is located at the Florida Power & Light power plant on SR62 East of Parrish, FL. This lake has a reputation as a phenomenal fishery for largemouth bass, pan fish and catfish. Sadly it has been closed to the public since September 11, 2001. Actually, that's good news because since that time the lake has received very little fishing pressure.

Recently the United Way has been authorized to hold three tournaments each year usually in November, January and April. Entry into these tournaments is \$350 per boat and includes up to three anglers. All proceeds benefit United Way of South Sarasota County, United Way Suncoast, and the United Way of Manatee County.

The tournaments do have cash payouts for the top three finishers in a total weight competition of \$1,000, \$750 and \$500 respectively and Calcutta payouts for the largest crappie (50% of pot) and largest lunker (100% of pot).

The Suncoast Fly Fishers board would like to know if members would be interested in participating in one of these tournaments because, if there is enough interest and members approve the club could buy an entry into an upcoming tournament and raffle the club's entry for \$1 each.

Each member could buy as many tickets as wanted. A drawing would be held to determine the winner. The winner could choose the two other participants that they wanted to fish with. It would not be a requirement that the other participants be club members.

Fly fishing is not a requirement but it would be the most fun and it might be the best way to catch the largest crappie. A vote will be taken at the next member meeting on November 19 to see if the membership would like the club to spend \$350 to provide this opportunity to our members.

#### Tying Bench

#### **Bob Burkard's Silly Putty Spoon Fly**



#### About this fly...

It is fun experimenting with different types of saltwater flies and I have been expanding my tying experience to include a few spoon fly patterns. I have had good luck with spoons when spin fishing and I thought that a lighter spoon would be great on a fly rod. I have caught a few fish on this new (to me) fly including small redfish, puffers, trout, ladyfish, catfish and crevalle jacks. I am working on the "big" redfish and snook.

I find this process is more like making a lure than tying a fly, but it still fishes like a fly only with lots of wiggle and wobble. I

know that there are different recipes on the Internet for spoon flies and I have tried a number of them. I really like this silly putty version; it is light enough to easily cast and yet it sinks nicely.

#### Materials:

- Hook: Mustad, 1/0 Saltwater Streamer Hooks 2XH/4XL
- Spoon to use as a mold: I like to use either a 1/8 oz Johnson Spoon or a ¼ oz Little Cleo
- Thread: Red UNI-Thread 6/0, I use mono to tie in the Weed Guard
- Red Krystal Flash
- Nail Polish with Gold Glitter
- .030 lead
- 16 lb Mason Hard mono for the Weed Guard
- Silly Putty
- Epoxy: I like to use Clear Cure Goo, thick for the initial coats, and then I top coat it with the thin Hydro

#### **Tying Sequence**

- 1. Bend your hook to match the shape of the spoon that you are using.
- 2. I like to tie in a little of the .030 lead on the keel of the fly so that it sinks quicker and with more action. This weight is optional, but I find that it makes the fly wobble more as it sinks.



- 3.(Left) Layer the lead with red thread and cover with glue (or Clear Cure Goo epoxy).
- 4. (Right) Lay a base of thread and palmer in red Krystal Flash. This gives color to the fly and also provides a base for the epoxy to grip.
- 5. (Right) Tie in a mono weed guard using the 16 lb mason line for the guard and the clear mono thread.
- 6. Take the hook out of your vice.





### Tying Bench, continued... Bob Burkard's Silly Putty Spoon Fly

7. (Right) Make a spoon mold in the Silly Putty with your chosen spoon. Roll the putty into a ball and then press it flat. Gently press the spoon into the top surface of the Silly Putty to make an impression. I like to go in a little deeper than the final thickness of the fly. Remove the Spoon from the Silly Putty: you now have your spoon fly mold.





- 8. (Left)) Brush the mold with a thin layer of Clear Cure Goo. I cure this layer with my UV light before adding the hook to the mold. Brushing epoxy up the sides will help make a concave face.
- 9. I add another thin layer of epoxy and hold the hook in the mold as I cure it with the UV light.
- 10. (Right) Remove your spoon fly from the mold by stretching the Silly Putty away from it until it separates. Bend the spoon "blank" just a little more to give it a concave underside by placing it in the meat of one hand and flexing the eye with the other hand. At this point in the process the spoon fly is very thin and very flexible, so be careful not to bend it too much or it will break.



11. File or trim any rough edges with scissors or an Emory board file. The additional layers of Clear Cure Goo epoxy that you will add later in the process will also help to smooth out rough edges.



- 12. Place the fly in your vice and paint the fly with the gold glitter nail polish. Cover both sides. Let the nail polish fully dry before proceeding further.
- $13. \ \mbox{If necessary, give the spoon fly one final touch-up with the emery board file.}$
- 14. I like to give the spoon fly another coat of thick Clear Cure Goo (but not too thick), and then finish up with a top coat (or

two) of the very thin Hydro Clear Cure Goo. Make sure that you fully cure the epoxy with the UV light between each layer.

### Bob Burkard, Member in the Spotlight



*Hometown.* My wife Carole and I moved to Oldsmar, FL almost four years ago from Douglassville, Pa.

When did you join Suncoast Fly Fishers? I joined Suncoast Fly Fishers 1 ½ years ago. This has been a great experience and I appreciate the friendships and the sharing of knowledge and advice from the club members.

What is your favorite game fish to catch on the fly and why? If you had asked me this question 3 years ago I would

have said that nothing could beat a rainbow trout rising for a dry fly on a cold mountain stream. However, since I started saltwater fly fishing in Tampa three years ago, I cannot imagine anything better than catching a large snook off a beach when sight fishing. They are a challenge to catch and provide a long and fun fight. With this said, I have not caught a bonefish or a tarpon yet to compare this to.

What are your top three places to fish? There are so many great places to fish that this is a very difficult question. So, in addition to my new home range here in Tampa Bay where the great fishing, the fantastic scenery and clear water simply cannot be beat, I would say that the Lehigh River in Eastern PA and the West Branch of the Delaware River in New York State are my favorite fly fishing destinations. Maybe I will change my mind once I have the opportunities to fish the Florida Keys and some Western US trout streams

**What is your favorite fly rod and reel?** My wife gave me a Scott 8wt with a Tibor Reel as a present when we moved to Florida and this has become my favorite saltwater fly fishing outfit.

How and when did you get introduced to fly fishing? Mountains, northern New Jersey, and New York State for all kinds of fish. I mainly used spinning tackle, but fly fished on and off. I caught my first bass on a fly rod when I was 11 years old, and have many great memories of fishing with family and friends.



However, I became a fly fishing fanatic over 15 years ago when I found a friend who loved to fly fish. He was a much better fly fisherman than I was and he helped me to "up my game." I made it my mission to improve my casting and to be able to match him when fishing dry flies. The friendly competition made fishing more fun. At this time I also became obsessed with tying my own flies.

Why do you like fly fishing compared to fishing with conventional tackle? I still use conventional tackle occasionally, but I like the challenge of fly fishing. I find the activities of "hunting" for fish and fly casting (especially if using my own flies) very rewarding.





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### Capt. Pat Damico: Fly Casting Clinic. Tip #72

"I love my XXX brand 8 wt rod, I'm getting the same in a 5 wt." I hear this frequently, later often followed by, "That 5 wt is a piece of junk!" Or, "I love my 8 ft., 7 wt brand XXX, I'm getting the same rod in a 9 1/2 ft. length." Again, an unhappy result.

The variations in performance even within the same model can be considerable, or can be satisfying. A reputable fly shop should let you try a rod. Changing the line can also make a world of difference. As a casting instructor, I always ask clients to bring their own equipment to a casting session. Of course I bring balanced equipment which they often end up using for the lesson because their equipment is problematic.

Rod price is often a distraction. Try before you buy!

#### Bob Morrison: How-To



**Does your fly box speak Spanish?** Just about now the Spanish mackerel are moving into the shallows along with the other gamefish. Try poppers and gurglers on the outing tide together with Clousers and deceivers fished deeper any time. These flies should be rather sparsely tied with some Krystal Flash tied in for shining visibility; fish them just above the tops of the weeds.

**Sometimes becoming unhinged is a good thing.** Some people like to use sinking tip line when fishing over the weeds in say four to

eight feet of water. I prefer a totally sinking line which seems to give the fly a straighter, more natural action across the bottom or grass bed. Finally, I am able to better control my fly with the sinking line. The sinking tip of a floating line sometimes causes the fly to bob up and down, an unnatural action which could discourage a fish from striking.

**Sounds like Don Coleman**. On those sparsely tied flies, shrimp patterns are working for all species of fish. For baitfish patterns use colors like a wise writer said a couple of years ago: "Bellies white, with backs of green, blue or black." A little chartreuse and yellow along the lateral line doesn't hurt either.

**Ziplock used flies**. Once you have fished flies, put them in a separate Ziplock bag away from the fly box. Do not return these flies to the box until they have been rinsed and dried. This step will keep salt contamination away from your unused flies.

"Don't overload yourself when wade fishing. Become a minimalist."


"Use weedless flies when fishing around weeds, mangroves, and obstructions."

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












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### David Putnam: Fly Fishing Reflections
