Chris Sexton's Snook Fly

About this fly...

After casting in vain at lots of snook, I was complaining to Chris Sexton and Ethan Kiburz at Flint Creek
Outfitters about the problem. Both of them said: "Steve Farar's fiber tied white and SPARSE." I bought some white and invited Chris to tie for SFF. At the tie-a-thon, he offered to trade me one of his flies for one of mine. I tried it that night and caught snook. And I have hooked or caught snook every night since (two different things-hooking and catching). Without directions, I improvised and modified to include peacock herl and crystal flash. SPARSE is the magic word. *Ken Hofmeister*

Materials

Hook: Gamakatsu SC-15 #1 Thread: Ultra Monofilament .006

Adhesive: Backcountry Laboratories Hard-As-Hull

Fibers: SF Blend White & Olive Epoxy: Loon UV Knot Sense Eyes: Mirage Eyes 7/32



Tying Sequence



Step 1: Start the thread at the mid point of the shank and advance the thread back to the bend where the bobbin hangs just about 1/8" behind the hook point.

Step 2: Take a very sparse clump of white SF fibers (about 20-30 fibers tops!), double over and cut to make it half the length. Then tie in the material at its mid point, creating an 1/8" thread dam.

Step 3: Pull back, fold over and cinch down on the portion of material that hangs over the eye of the hook. Hit the thread bump with hard-ashull.

Step 4: Repeat steps 2 and 3, twice more, leaving you with three folded over sections of white.

Step 5: Repeat steps 2 and 3 one last time with a sparse clump of olive SF fibers. Then whip finish and hit with hardas-hull.

Step 6: Apply the Loon directly to the material before you stick on the eyes. Make sure the material has absorbed the epoxy and then stick on the eyes. Cure.

Step 7: Do a final coat of UV epoxy over the eyes. Use the rotary function of the vise to rotate the fly which will smooth out the layer of epoxy.

Capt. Pat Damico: Fly Casting Clinic. Tip #71



By Capt. Pat Damico, IFFF Master Casting Instructor

The rear taper decreases in diameter from the thicker belly section to the much smaller running line on a weight forward line. The rear taper creates the transition so important to casting smoothness. A short rear taper will kick the energy quickly into the head, turning the line over fast. A long rear taper delays this turnover. Long rear tapers are preferred for big waters and long casts; a short rear taper for smaller water and shorter casts.

Pat Damico, St. Pete Beach

Capt. Pat Damico: Dock light Tarpon

Capt. Pat Damico in the Tampa Bay Times:

This has been a banner year for smaller tarpon in the Tampa Bay area. Dock lights have been holding a good number of tarpon up to 30 pounds with an occasional larger one cruising near the lights to take advantage of the concentration of baitfish. Snook, reds and trout are the usual customers frequenting lights, but tarpon will be there too. Lights near structure, docks, bridges and marinas are a good place to start. Be very cautious on your approach. Watch the lighted area from a distance using an electric motor at a very slow speed. Good tidal flow is needed to get these fish to accept your offering. This is strictly a sight fishing situation where long accurate casts are needed. If you can't do a saltwater quick cast, get a good casting instructor to help perfect your technique. This will help in all saltwater fly sight casting. If you're not a night person and you want other baby tarpon choices, explore the many rivers that go into the bay and Gulf. Early morning will bring these silver rockets rolling on the surface helping you find their location. If they do not show, concentrate casting small baitfish patterns around the above mentioned structure. If there is no surface activity, use a full sinking line as these elusive fish will spend most of their time close to the bottom. When you find one, more will be nearby.

Bob Morrison: How-To



Mac Attack. We are currently seeing large baitfish schools both offshore and inshore. Game fish are after them, and the game fish include Spanish mackerel, both off the beaches and in the backwaters of the Bay. Watch for diving terns, gulls, and pelicans to locate the action. Casting flashy white minnow pattern flies and silver spoon flies should produce good results. Consider wire tippets for those sharp mackerel teeth.

Crab patterns reign. Afternoon incoming tides will find redfish on the oyster beds, looking for small crabs. Try Smitty's Frank Rhodes dark crab pattern (SFF newsletter, December 2013); also try a bluebodied mud crab, a dark fiddler or a tan-bodied blue crab pattern.

Fish the crab fly. Eat the real ones. Tie the tan-bodied blue crab in foam with a white foam belly and the hook point down. Cast it in the early morning, when the blues go swimming on the surface. Bring a fine-mesh net with a long handle, and maybe you can catch a few of the larger crabs for your own eating enjoyment.

Game fish love pinfish. In early morning high tides about now, try fly patterns that resemble pinfish, such those offered by Craig Smothers of the Sarasota Mangrove Fly Fishers fly tying school. Find Craig online at mangrovecoastflyfishers.com (website) ormethods:mangrovecoastflyfishers.com (webs

Tailing reds look up, too. Finally, try gurglers and poppers on a early morning outgoing tide for those tailing redfish.


Gems from Don Coleman, RIP

Keep tension in the fly line throughout the entire cast and during the retrieve. Keep your rod tip down when fighting a fish. The tip of the rod is for casting, the butt for fighting. Fight a fish from the first stripping guide up from the grip.




