Tying Bench

Smitty's Beach Snook Fly



The snook fly, as noted, is great fished along the beaches. It is a great baitfish pattern for dock light fishing as well. I tie it in various sizes from a 2/0 hook down to a size 4 or even 6 when the bait is on the small side, like in the spring. *Layne Smith*

Materials

Hook: Mustad C47SD "Shrimp" Hook #1 Thread: Danville Flat Waxed Nylon White

Tail: Craft Fur tapered

Collar: Arctic Fox Body Fur (placed in dubbing loop and

palmered)

Head: UV Pearl ICE dub (tied in then folded back over body)

Eyes: Any 3-D molded eye to size

Finish: Clear fish skull, UV Resin or epoxy

Tying Sequence

Step 1: Right above hook point tie in craft fur tail one and a half to twice hook shank length.

Step 2: Advance thread slightly and create dubbing loop; insert arctic fox and twirl creating a brush.

Step 3: Palmer brush forward at the same time stroking back the arctic fox fibers to create body.

Step 4: Finish palmering just short of hook eye then tie in a small bunch of UV Pearl Ice Dub. (Make sure to tie the dubbing at it's midpoint and that it encircles hook shank).

Step 5: Whip finish and cut thread, and then fold back the dubbing that is extending past the hook eye. (Make sure that your dubbing radiates out from hook eye as you fold it back so you are covering the whole head of the fly not just folding it back on top).

Step 6: Place 3-D eyes on fly and then coat with UV Resin creating a head. (If you like you can use epoxy instead or one of the new clear "fish heads."

Brad Lowman: Surfing for Snook

Sometimes you don't want to match the hatch

Back in August 2014 Brad Lowman's friend Tom was catching some big snook on the beaches. Brad, not so many.

Brad didn't feel too good about this, you can tell: "He was throwing this stupid fly, a fluffy polar fiber thing with dumbbell eyes. I was throwing EP fiber minnows and schminnows and they looked just like the scaled sardines swimming on the surface just

above the snook." Brad's match the hatch flies weren't attracting much interest, especially not from any three-footers.

Then a light bulb flickered on over Brad's head. That matchthe-hatch fly he was throwing was just one among zillions of real sardines. Snook weren't hungry for the real thing. Why would they give a hoot for his imitation?

Hey, those snook weren't looking up to eat minnows. They were looking down into the sand for something a bit more tasty. Sand fleas, maybe? Sand perch? Well, yeah.

So this past August Lowman came armed to the beaches with "stupid" puff ball whatchamacallits featuring big, heavy, dumbbell eyes. Here snookie, snookie. Want a sand perch? Look down now, Darlin', here's a tasty sand flea.

Brad spoke at the August meeting of Suncoast Fly Fishers. He tied his two go-to bottom bumpers and then he told us his snook evolution story and he showed us slide after slide of two and three footers that apparently like his stupid puffball perch and sand flea on Pinellas beaches like Redington Shores, Passa-Grille, Shell Key, Sunset Beach.

Tom Gadacz: Oregon Adventure 2015

Arriving in Sisters, Oregon at 8:30 PM to check into our hotel and get some dinner began our central Oregon fly fishing adventure. The city of Sisters is high desert with surrounding snow covered mountain peaks. Checking in was no problem and we were informed the only place still open for dinner was Hardtails Bar and Grill. It is a biker bar with "good" hamburgers. The hamburger was good, the bikers friendly with advice on their fishing spots and the microbrew was excellent.

A crisp 47-degree morning started with breakfast at Sisters Coffee Company which became one of our favorite spots. The décor was western with wood paneling, balconies with log railings, and a huge stone fireplace surround by local wildlife trophies. The coffee and breakfast was great and the surroundings relaxing. Great way to start the day.

Checking into the Fly Fishers Place we hooked up with our guide, Steve Erickson. We brought all our equipment; however, Vibram boots were not recommended for our Deschutes River trip. The shop loaned us studded felt soled boots and later we were thankful for the change.

We fished the Deschutes from Warm Springs to Trout Creek. The scenery was great with the surrounding mountains and wildlife. Since fishing from a boat on this section of the Deschutes is not permitted we used the drift boat to get to Steve's fishing spots.

The current was swift and the bottom had rocks that required cautious wading. We caught several nice rainbows and white fish and toward the end of the trip Nick hooked and landed a 20+" rainbow. He had a feisty one which took several leaps, made several good runs, and eventually landed in Steve's net. Anything on the Deschutes above 20 inches is considered a steelhead so Nick got one fish with two names.

The next day East Lake, situated 65 miles away and at 6,400 feet was our destination fishing for kokanee (sockeye salmon). The scenery was remarkable with hills of volcanic obsidian rock and areas of diatomaceous earth formed by fossilized aquatic organisms. We sight casted for several hours and latter trolled for the big fellas. We caught three different species – rainbow, brown, and kokanee.

The next day was a get-together with some of the IFFF Council presidents at Oregon President Sherry Steele's place in Sisters.

After lunch and a talk about the Metolius River we fished a beautiful river with deep gorges, ice blue water and caught kokanee as well as brook trout and rainbows. It is formed from many springs,

underground rivers and snow fed streams. It has a constant temperature of 48 degrees.

We started near the headwaters and continued downstream to Riverside, the Gorge, and Wizard Falls. This is not an easy river to fish. The gorges are deep, the water very swift and many areas with difficult access. We had several strikes and a beautiful hike.



Capt. Pat Damico: Fly Casting Clinic. Tip #70

Do you and your fly line have a mutual understanding?

In discussing the components of a fly line we are attempting to answer an interesting quote by Martin Joergensen, "My fly line doesn't understand me! And I don't understand it...." The belly is the heaviest and thickest part of a fly line. The energy of the cast is carried here. A long belly would be seen in steelhead, salmon and most general saltwater weight forward tapers. When used properly, they will cast normal flies a longer distance. A short belly is seen in bass, muskie, pike and Clouser weight forward tapers. These are designed to cast a heavier, more resistant fly shorter distances quickly. Remember, all fly lines cast best when there is minimal overhang, meaning the head, which includes the belly, should be just outside of the rod tip when the cast is executed with only the thin running line in the rod.

Time for the inshore slam

Snook set up on points, around bars, and also in potholes on negative falling tides around the new and full moons. Reds will favor the potholes. Throw a white DT special tied on a #4 hook for snook. Throw a Dupree Spoon fly for reds.

Look for trout on scattered grassy-sandy areas. Target trout with chartreuse and white Clouser minnows.





Bob Morrison: How-To

Mini-first aid kit. If you are not carrying a first aid kit with you when you are fishing, then you should. Just fill a Ziplock bag with tweezers, Bandaids, disinfectant swabs, SPF lip balm, pain killers, antacid tablets, etc., and carry them in a crush-proof box. You might be glad you did.

Repair your landing net. If you carry a landing net, sooner or later you will get holes in the mesh. To keep these holes from getting larger, coat the edges of the mesh around the hole with "Aquaseal" sealer. The sealer should hold things together until you can do something more permanent. You might also carry some strong cord for tying up holes in cord-mesh nets.

Re-use silica packets. Try using those little silica packets that come in shoes, electronics, etc., to prevent moisture buildup in reel cases, rod tubes, camera cases, and anywhere else needing such protection.

Salt water is especially brutal. Carry a few silicone-impregnated cloths to wipe down anything that has been exposed to salt. Use these in nooks and crannies that you might otherwise miss. Use after freshwater washing as well.

Study the shallows. It's late in the summer, and springtime finger mullet are now five to six inches long, so size your flies accordingly. Watch the shallows for other baitfish, and size flies to match or contrast. The same goes for color. Whatever works.





David Putnam: Fly Fisher Reflections



Spinning Hair

There's hot in-season fishing in every direction if I look at the "Action Spotter" in *Florida Sportsman*—countless world-class fishing spots, fresh and salt water. In under three hours, I can be bass fishing in Lake Kissimmee. South two hours there's Ding Darling Wildlife Refuge. It's another hour to Chockoloskee and Everglades City. The 10,000 Islands should be enough for good fishing.

Don't tell anyone outside the fly club, but I've been buying patches of dyed deer belly hair. Sounds crazy doesn't it? When I ordered online I attached a note asking for any particularly long hair that would be suitable for spinning

snook flies. Maybe they'd rummage around and find some choice pieces for a new customer from Florida, a sweetheart of a guy who wants nothing more than to spin hair into the wee hours—good, long, straight hair without much under-fur.

They sent me garbage, hair patches suitable for tying some sort of size 16 trout nymphs, I suppose, none of it more than 3/4 inches long. It won't work, but it *was* expensive...I wrote 'em back and a woman suggested by email that maybe regular buck tail would have been better. She explained that it's longer than belly hair. Rather than write her back, "No s—-t! It's also useless," I threw what I'd bought in the trash, and drove over to Bill Jackson's and found exactly what I was looking for. Brad Lowman, a good snook fisherman and the manager of the fly fishing department, probably hand-selected the deer hair patches. You get my drift, right? Right here in the St. Pete area we've got professionals to guide us. Why I sometimes forget that and buy online is a mystery. Brad can tell you where to *fish*, for heavens sakes!

I stopped by a friend's house the other night and asked him what he was catching his snook on recently. He showed me a plastic bag containing the exact hooks, thread and other materials he'd need to tie more of his special fly, along with a fly already tied to use as a model. It might be a year, he explained, before he'd want to tie more, and having everything at hand saved lots of time and aggravation.

He has bags for bonefish flies he doesn't tie often, and bags for his tying freshwater poppers, and bags with differing eyes and hooks and flash and buck tail colors for his usual Clouser Minnows. One bag had a note in it about the right hackle length for his favorite tarpon fly, along with special short-shank hooks he likes. It said, TARPON on it in bold magic marker.

He never buys online, but goes to his favorite fly shop and replenishes his bags and talks fishing with the pro on duty.

I've got that good spinning hair, but doggone it, I think I'm out of those Gamagatsu hooks I liked. I've got thousands of hooks in special boxes, but some of them date back to the 1990s. They're just sitting there waiting for someone to tie stuff around 'em.
