

Capt. Pat Damico: Ask him anything

Capt. Pat Damico was our November meeting speaker and facilitated a back-and-forth discussion on fly fishing issues brought up by members at the meeting. He gave his frank opinions on those matters, too.

Questions and Pat's answers (paraphrased) are in italics...

When is the best time to go fishing? Do you want to go fishing or not? Just go. That said, look at tide charts. Understand what they mean. If you have negative tides it's a good time to look around, scout for drop-offs. If a cold front is on the way, it's usually



a very good time to fish because fish will be feeding. When a high pressure system dominates it's usually not the best time for catching fish. Have a log of each trip. Note conditions, what worked and what didn't.

Do you wear waders in the winter? *I wear them in the winter and summer, especially in the summer because of bacteria.*

How important is the quality of the fly rod? *It's important but probably not as important as having a balanced outfit. That said, a lot of people do get a lot of satisfaction fishing with high end rods and reels.*

What's the best way to build a leader? I use four feet of 40-pound test for the butt, two feet of 30-pound test for the middle, and two feet of 20-pound test for the tippet. All Ande. For sharp toothed fish you may also need to add a bite tippet. One of the objectives is to have a leader that lets you deliver the fly smoothly.

When they sell leaders they are usually categorized as 1X, 2X, 4X, 6X and so forth. How do those relate to leader strength? The higher you go the lighter the leader. Roughly speaking, a 4X leader tests at 6 pounds. A 6X leader tests at 2 pounds.

How do you care for your equipment? Clean your fly line with a rag with warm, soapy water. Ivory soap; must be non-detergent. Wipe with a clean, wet cloth, then a dry cloth. I store the rods horizontally in one piece so they're already assembled and ready to put in the boat. Rinse rods thoroughly with a hose using a fine spray on all reel parts after each use. Occasionally take the spool off reel and clean and lubricate according to manufacturers instructions.

Do you use dressing on your fly line? Yes, but only recommended ones, then wipe it off. By the way, when you get ready to fish don't forget to stretch the line to get rid of the coils.

If you only had one fly to fish with what would it be? *Most members agree that a chartreuse over white Clouser minnow for saltwater*.

Question of the Month

What is the single best thing about catching a gamefish on the fly?



Capt. Ray Markham: Sight-fishing for gamefish on the fly is the epitome of the sport of fishing. The hunt-stalk-fooling the fish and landing it...it doesn't get any better.

Duane Mertz: The fight. I can feel every moment of the fish. Then having a clean release.

Myron Hansen: *Sight-casting the docklights and catching a fish on a fly that I tied. Exciting!*



Jeff Kopelman: *The uncertainty of the catch.*

Hilton Bruch: *The electricity of the hit and having your hand in direct communication with the fish is the best.*

Ray Smith: *The fight and knowing you tied that fly that caught the fish.*

Tom Gadacz: *The excitement of being outdoors*

Peter Cline: *Watching it swim away!*

Bob Burkard: Fly fishing is the most challenging kind of fishing. Catching a game fish is the most fun.

Robert Morrison: First, the hunt for the fish. Then, the fighting, landing, and looking at these beautiful creatures.

Arthur Birnkrant: When I was very young I enjoyed catching gamefish with flies. I expect it is the same now.

Dick Miekka: Landing it, then letting it go!

Joe Tyrrell: Fishless in 33 years.

Tying Bench Pat Damico's "40 Snook" Destroyer Fly



This is a destroyer pattern fly much talked about since somebody reporting catching 40 snook in one outing.

I watched Don Reed tie this fly in different colors at the Florida Fly Fishing Expo in Crystal River. You can watch it being tied on this You Tube video, too.

Experiment with different colors and sizes.

Materials

Hook: Gamakatsu SL12S

Tail: Finnish Raccoon with Krystal Flash crown

Collar. Red Estaz Grande Eyes: Wapsi dumbbell eyes Body: EP Dubbing Brush

Weed guard: 20-30 pound Mason mono

Tying Instructions

Step 1. Cover hook with thread and end about 1/8" from eye. Place dumbbell eyes 3mm in front of eye and take thread back to hook point.

Step 2. Select clump of Finnish Raccoon hair for tail. Do not remove underfur, trim butt part to give you proper tail length and tie on top of hook wrapping back to before hook bends. Make 2 or 3 turns around base of hair creating a post that stands up. Select 6 strands of Krystal flash that when folded around thread will be almost as long as tail. Secure this with thread spreading them around tail.

Step 3. Coat all thread with Dave's Flexament. Tie in red Estaz Grande and make 2 or 3 wraps forward, ending at hook point; tie off and trim excess. This provides throat, gills, blood line, etc.

Step 4. Select EP Shrimp Dubbing Brush or use dubbing loop to make your own and tie in front of Estaz. Wrap EP material forward stroking each turn with a dog hair brush toward tail. Figure eight dumbbell eyes and continue wrapping and stroking leaving enough room for a head. Tie off and whip finish and coat head with cement. Use dog brush for final shaping and trim excess with scissors.

This year the casting clinic at Picnic Island Park was hosted by the Tampa Bay Fly Fishing Club on Saturday, Dec. 3. This is an annual event alternating between the TBFFC and Suncoast Fly Fishers. Picnic Island provided adequate space for the casting stations however the wind did present a little challenge but that is part of fishing. Dayle Mazzarella set up the program and course.

We had several excellent assistants including Pat Damico, Leigh West, Steve Parker, Chris O'Byrne, Jim Schneider and Mike Santangelo (both from Naples), and Tom Gadacz. Barbara Mazzarella registered the attendees and signed up new IFFF members.

The casting clinic is primarily staffed by IFFF Certified Master Casting Instructors and Certified Casting Instructors. The casting

clinics are free to all IFFF members and \$35 for others which includes an IFFF membership. We had 30 attendees, including six new members, eight instructors, seven youths, and two women.

Dayle had the attendees pair up and the morning session stressed basic casting fundamentals and drills to improve casting. Added this year was a fish catching drill and a program for those interested in fly casting achievement without a teaching requirement.

After lunch, there were eight stations that rotated every 30 minutes and included the roll cast, double haul, basic knots and rigging, quick cast, casting heavy lines and flies, distance casting, casting in the wind, and levels of casting achievement.

It was a great session and provided IFFF members an opportunity to improve their casting skills as a benefit of their membership.

Tom Gadacz: Big Gun Shootout at Picnic Island Park

The Big Gun Shoot-Out was sponsored by the Tampa Bay Fly Fishing Club (TBFFC) at Picnic Island Park in Tampa on November 20. The Big Gun Shoot-Out is a competitive fly casting contest and draws some of the best casters in Florida.

The event began in 1994. It currently consists of 6 stations and includes Distance Competition, Accuracy Competition, "V" Fish, Through the Hoop Cast, Carl Hanson Cup, and Under the Mangrove Cast. Each station has defined casting criteria based either on a specific number of casts or a limited time period. Each station was scored with maximum points of 100 and the total of the six stations determines the final score.

The final Big Gun Shoot-Out included the ten best distance scores on the initial round. There were 11 teams of three individuals. There were individual as well as team winners. Of the 34 that participated in this year's event, Bryon Chamberlin won the final distance round with a cast of 123' 4". Colby Hane won the overall

(individual) championship with a score of 452.

The three members of the winning team, "East West," were Dave Chouinard, Eric Davis, and Dave Olson with a combined total score of 1175. Dick Miekka registered all the casters and recorded the scores.

Suncoast Fly Fishers had Team Cast-A-Ways with John Craig, Rick Warfel and Tom Gadacz. Other SFF Big Gun competitors included Pat Damico, Dick Miekka, and Andy Constantinou.

It was a great event and an opportunity to meet some excellent casters.

Bob Morrison: Fly Fishing How-To



Mullet eat flies that look like grass

Always pick up slack line when fishing. Keeping your line tight allows you to set the hook with a strip strike as soon as you feel a fish take the fly. Remember, you have to be quick to get the hook in before the fish discovers that this bait is a phony, and drops it.

Stretch your line and leader before fishing, especially if the line has been on the reel for a while. Clean and lubricate the line with pads available at fly shops. Do not use ArmorAll which is said to be corrosive to fly lines. You can also use mild hand soap and warm water to clean a line, rinsing it thoroughly.

Rays and Sharks. Don't wade where you cannot see the bottom, otherwise you may get stung by a ray that doesn't notice you coming. Freeze, remaining still, if you see a shark. Have a wading staff ready to ward off any shark that gets too close for comfort. Don't wade wet, especially in the bay. The risk of acquiring a dangerous infection from polluted water is just too great to ignore. Wear waders or hip boots at all times.

How to catch a mullet on a fly. Did you know that you can catch mullet on a fly. Tie a small green nymph-like fly on a size 8 or 10 hook using fuzzy green material. Tie both light and dark-shaded flies. Mullet are strong fighters and also can be good to eat. Consult an oriental market or the net on recipes on how to prepare and cook them.

Stop false casting unnecessarily

Go out on the grass and with a practice fly see how little line you need outside the rod tip to make a forward cast, shooting some line, with only one backcast. Next, see how much line you can pick up, make a good backcast and shoot line forward, again, with only one backcast. Make a one-inch wide mark on your line near the reel at each of these locations. You now know your range of casting within those two marks with this setup. With practice, you can make this range even larger. Fishing on water with floating lines, sink tips, heavier flies will cause some variables. When you work a fly, don't bring it closer than your range, because false casting in the air, where there aren't any fish, is a waste of time.

Jacks are back. A challenging catch

The cold winter of 2010-11 devastated the local population of jack crevalle and other tropical species, including snook. Once plentiful, jacks provided excitement that most long-rod enthusiasts could depend on. The roar from a school crashing baitfish frequently interrupted our pursuit of local game fish. Scorned because of poor table appeal, they were made for anyone who wanted a fish that would hit anything looking like a fleeing meal and pulled like you hooked a dragster. They don't feed on slack tides, often appearing when water is really moving. Points, docks and bridges that hold bait are good places to look. Trout fishers recently had frequent doubles as they cast to bait-chasing schools, resulting in one broken 8 weight. High sticking or using the middle of the rod as a lever spells disaster for fly rods. Size can be more than 10 pounds so rig appropriately. A 9-weight with a weight-forward floating line, adequate 20-pound backing and a leader that sports a 25- to 30-pound hard mono bite tippet will work. Synthetic baitfish patterns the size of what you see in the water with hooks that don't bend under steady pressure should have the barbs crimped for easy release. Strip set the hook with authority to penetrate hard mouths. Keep rod tips close to the water to apply steady pressure on hooked fish. Your connection between fly line and backing must be smooth so it doesn't catch on guides.




