Pulled pork for lunch. Arrowhed Picnic Area, Pavilion 3



#### Captain Dan Bumgarner: How to Fish Fort DeSoto Park

I hope a lot of you are planning to join us at the Fort De Soto Park outing on Saturday February 20. A couple of reminders for those that have not visited the park in a while:

• There is a \$5 fee per vehicle to enter the park. If you come to the park before or after regular hours, there are stand-alone pay stations at the boat ramps and along the roadway coming in. If you are launching your boat at Fort DeSoto Park the fee is \$6 and that also serves as admission for the rest of the park. We will have low water early with a high a little after noon. The solunars look best from around 11 until 1. Like the fish, we will be eating then. (Editor's note: great minds think alike?)

#### Continued... Bumgarner: How to Fish Fort DeSoto Park

#### For the wade fishermen

You can fish basically anywhere that you can get access to the water; however, use caution as some areas have soft bottoms that make for miserable wading. As you enter the park you will see an area on the left where you can park and launch a kayak or wade the shorelines in either direction. The little bridge just after the toll station would be a good place to explore. There is an area just south of the small bridge where you can park and walk back to the bridge. The culvert under the bridge connects Mullet Key Bayou and the waters west of Bonnie Fortune Key. Continuing east from the intersection at the flagpole you will find the roadway to the maintenance area on the left. You cannot go into the maintenance area but you can access the water on either side at the entrance. Farther to the east you will come to the end of the bike/multipurpose trail on the south side of the roadway. This is a good spot to reach the grass flats in that area. The bottom to the south and east of Conception Key and the turnaround area is soft but the bottom on the north side is good. Going west from the flagpole you will find a sand road on the right that leads back to the old ferry landing in Mullet Key Bayou. The area to the east of the landing is soft and may prove difficult to wade. Wading is much better to the west. Continuing around to the northern end of the park you will find the Arrowhead picnic area. From this area you have easy access to the Bunces Pass area. Wading straight out from the Arrowhead Picnic area you will find good grass flats with very good tidal flow. Casting out into the channel and retrieving up over the drop off should get you some trout.

#### For the boaters

Staying south of the Bunces Pass channel let's go east to the old burned out barge near marker number 11. There is a large flat stretching out to the west of the barge. This flat can hold tailing reds on an incoming tide. Both the northern and southern edges of this flat are good areas for trout. The northern edge offers many nice pot holes that should hold trout. Marker number 12 in the Bunces channel sits almost in the middle of a bar that can be very good for trout. The area northwest of Conception at the east end of the park is another area with promising pot holes. This location has also been loaded with pompano on occasions. Just to the east of the Bunces Pass Bridge you will find an unmarked channel that will lead back to the west side of Bonnie Fortune key. Depending on the tide the channel may take some maneuvering to get in but once there you will find great grass flats extending out from the mangrove shoreline. This whole area is good for trout and reds. On the west side of the Bunces Bridge and just beyond the boat ramps you will find the entrance channel to Mullet Key Bayou. The channel leads back to the old ferry landing mentioned earlier. The whole bayou is a controlled speed zone and parts of it are no combustion engine zones. This is a great area for kayakers to access from either the boat ramps or the ferry landing.

#### As for what to fish with

Remember the water has finally dropped into winter temperatures so make it brown and get it down. Small shrimp and crab imitations fished just over the grass should work. I usually drift and blind cast if the wind is not too strong, otherwise I anchor or stake-out on a spot, fish it well, then move on. With the low tide we will look for tailers early on the Conception Key flat and on the flats in both the bayous. There are a lot of oyster mounds along the various mangrove shorelines that will hold reds. Casting a Clouser into the sandy area around the oysters could be productive. Try shrimpy colors.

#### Pat Damico: Popular Fly Casting Clinic Returns to Maximo Park

On Saturday, March 5, Suncoast Fly Fishers and the Tampa Bay Fly Fishing Club will host a Fly Casting Clinic with two Master Casting Instructors (MCI) – Dayle Mazzarella and Pat Damico -- who will be assisted by two other well known instructors and casters in the Tampa Bay area, Leigh West and Steve Parker.



Registration is at 8:00 am. The course starts promptly at 8:30 am and continues until approximately 3 pm.

#### Report: New Members Ryan, Will and Cooper Sollars



In mid-January Will Sollars caught his first saltwater fish in Boca Ciega Bay on a winter pattern Clouser given to him by Capt. Pat Damico.



In January Cooper Sollars caught a monster bass – 7 pounds, 12-ounces – on a bait caster fishing one of the Fish Hawk ponds.

#### Tom Gadacz: FWC's Snook Symposium



FWC held a snook symposium on January 13, 2016, at the Caribe Royale in Orlando, FL. The purpose of the symposium was to present updated snook research and solicit input from Floridians. Jessica McCawley, Division Director Marine Fisheries Management, welcomed everyone. Speakers giving the research update included Philip Stevens, Joy Young, Robert Muller, Alexis Trotter, and Melissa Recks.

Snook are protandric hermaphrodites and hatch as males and transform to females when they are older. Apparently this process is influenced within a group of snook. Snook can live more than 20 years and reach 50 inches. Average snook on the east coast weigh 9.4 pounds and on the Gulf coast 7.2 pounds. They live in estuary and intermediate offshore waters as well as fresh water rivers and canals. They usually return to the same waters to spawn but may spawn offshore and will usually return to the offshore site. The usual spawning time ranges from April to October. Juveniles seek the safety of estuaries. Males reach sexual maturity in 2 to 3 years and females in 3 to 4 years. Researchers tag snook to follow migration and spawning patterns and various types of tags are used including ones that emit radio waves.

There seems to be a higher natural mortality rate for west coast snook than east coast snook and some of the factors include cold kills and red tide. West coast snook mature faster than east coast ones and in general are doing better than the east coast snook. How can one population be healthier than the other if the mortality rate is higher? The concise answer is that mortality is only one of several factors used to evaluate the health of a population.

Determination of the size of the fish that can be kept has varied and is influenced by the estimate of breeding females and the upcoming male population that will transform into females.

The spawning potential ratio (SPR) is defined as the ratio of mature fish in the population compared to an unfished state and the management goal of 40% is used to provide buffer against episodic environmental events such as a cold weather kill or red tide. In 2006, the SPR for both east and west coast was around 25%. Regulatory changes put in place in 2007 are helping achieve an SPR of 40%. Because of the cold kill in 2010, the season was closed. Snook harvest reopened on the east coast in September 2011. It did not open on the Gulf coast at all until Sept. 2013.

Stocks are now rebuilding and snook stamp funds have generated money for more robust stock assessment. A stakeholder survey was conducted and additional discussions are scheduled for the rest of 2016. More information can be found here.

#### Tying Bench

#### Capt. Dan Bumgarner's Glass Minnow



Lately we have been talking about flies for winter fishing. Winter flies are generally tied smaller with shrimp and crab colors; patterns get more use. Another very important winter forage is juvenile anchovies and silversides. They are often referred to as rain bait, blood minnows and glass minnows. I thought this pattern would approximate these tiny bait fish. The pattern is basically a very small surf candy. Here are the materials and steps for tying it.

#### Materials

Hook: Size 4 or 6 Mustad 34007

Optional hook wrap: .022 lead free solder

Head: Mono thread

Body: Polar Fiber --- brown and beige

Flashabou

Tubing: EZ Body braid 1/8-inch dia.

Eyes: 3D stick on eyes Glue: Solarez UV resin

#### **Tying Sequence**

**Step one**: Wrap 10 -12 turns of the solder around the hook shank. (This is optional.)

**Step two**: Lay a thread base from the hook eye back to above the barb.

**Step three**: Invert the hook to tie in a bundle of beige polar fiber for the belly starting about one eye width behind the eye of the hook. After removing the under fur and hand stacking the bundle should be about the diameter of the lead in a wooden pencil and a little over 2 inches long. Bind the bundle down with open spiral wraps to the bend of the hook and back to the tie in point.

**Step four**: Turn the hook right side up and repeat the tie in process for a bundle of brown Polar Fiber on top of the hook.

**Step five**: Tie in 4-6 strands of Flashabou down each side. Bind the flash to the sides of the body and tie off behind the hook eye and clip the thread.

**Step six**: Prepare a piece of EZ Braid tube about ¾ of an inch long by very carefully melting one end with a flame to prevent unraveling. From the burned end of the tube make a cut about ¼ inch long on the bottom of the tube. This cut will accommodate the bend of the hook later.

**Step seven**: Slide the melted end of the tube over the eye of the hook and position the cut to accept the hook bend. Reattach the tying thread and whip finish the front end of the tube to secure it. Clip the thread.

**Step eight**: Apply a thin coat of thin UV resin over the entire body braid tube. Rotate and allow the resin to penetrate the body. Harden with the UV light.

**Step nine**: Use small drops of thick UV resin to apply the 3D eyes. Once the eyes are in a satisfactory position harden with the UV light.

**Step ten**: Apply more UV resin to build up the desired finish to complete the fly.

#### **Creepy Backcasts**

At the Somerset, NJ, show recently while participating in the Examiner
Development Program (EDP) -- on snow covered ground -- two members of
the IFFF Casting Board of Governors were watching me cast. After what we
all felt was a satisfactory completion of a task, Mac Lord, also on the board
(also our Hog Roast speaker last year and the guy who gave us a great video
casting clinic at Picnic Island) was observing from a distance and walked
over and said, "Do that again, Pat, without creep on your last cast."

#### What is "creep?"

Creep is defined as, "Allowing the rod to move forward on a backcast (without power) before the unrolling back loop has straightened." When the rod stops on a backcast at the proper position, it should not move forward prematurely. Even when this is a small amount, it will affect the cast in many ways. Once noticed some casters can make an immediate correction. If having difficulty, there is one thing that you can do that always prevents creep--drift the rod. Drift is defined as the 'repositioning of the rod (without power) that comes after the completion of the backcast." This is usually a

backward movement of the rod occurring as the back loop straightens. This is much more visible when standing further from a caster.

It is always better to be a drifter instead of a creep!

#### Pat Damico's Captain's Corner: via Tampa Bay Times

As winter approaches, water starts to cool and baitfish are more scarce. Open-water temperatures drop faster, but some small baitfish, especially glass minnows, will be in canals and well-protected deeper areas, especially where the sun can warm the darker bottom. Seawalls, wooden structure such as docks, and boats with large hulls absorb heat, inviting fish to stay close. Our low tides are midday so bankers' hours might be in order for snook, reds and trout. As the tide comes in, feeding activity should increase. A water thermometer is a necessity. A few degrees makes a difference. Seek the warmest places. On the shallow grass flats, fish will be in sand holes, improving sight-fishing opportunities. Probe these with well-placed casts. A smooth surface with no wind might help fly casting, but larger fish will spook easier. A ripple on the surface will get you closer to fish. Fish on the windward side rather than in the lee because wind pushes plankton close to shore and available baitfish will be there feeding.

#### Bob Morrison: How-To



**Stormy in Mobile? Then fish St. Pete today.** Fish will usually hit better on a falling barometer. If a storm is coming tomorrow, fish today. However, if a storm is imminent, get off the water before it hits. Mind the lightning.

**Slow down, you move too fast.** Vary your retrieve speed. If you are not getting any hits, slow it down, especially if you are using a crab fly pattern. The same goes for fly size. If you get no hits on the size you are using, go to a smaller fly. A sixteen-inch fish might be

intimidated by a five-inch fly so try it smaller as necessary.

**Explore the water column**. Find the correct depth. Start shallow, and go deeper with weighted flies as necessary. Mark your weighted flies so that you can tell them apart from the unweighted ones.

**This is slick**. Look for areas where the surface is smooth and "slick" looking. They probably hold bait fish.

**Can you see the bottom?** In clear water, white flies are at their best, so try those white finger mullets when the sun is out.

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
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#### Bill AuCoin: Flyfisher Flyover

These huge specimens, each with the right kind of genetics, will help guarantee more lunker Florida strain bass in Florida's future. I lost an 8-pound bass one time. So, was that a good thing? **More good news.** Florida's Fish and Wildlife researchers say numbers appear to show that catching bass on their spawning beds poses little risk to a lake's bass population. (FWC)

**Is this what they call "crowdsourcing?"** You buy this app for your iPhone or Android and then you log in and find out where the fish are biting ... in real time. Who wants to test this for the club? Lemme know. We tip the OTF hat to Tom Jones for this one. (Fish Brain)
