

## Outing Preview: Urban Outing, St. Pete's North Shore Park



We'll have a fairly steep and high incoming tide for the urban outing. (Tides4fishing.com)

Our next outing is our urban outing and it will take place on Saturday August 19 with lunch at noon at Flora Wylie Park in downtown St Pete.

Our designated fish award goes to the member catching the longest seatrout. Also, the annual tournament contest is still in play. The fishing boundary extends from the entrance to Coffee Pot Bayou

on the north to Demens Landing Park on the south. You can fish as far to the east as you want so long as you can see North Shore Park.

In previous outings in this location our members have caught ladyfish, trout, snook, redfish, mangrove snappers, and sheepsheads. On the flats my first choice for flies would be EP minnows or my favorite deceivers in Chartreuse and white. And no one can go wrong by using Clousers. If it is calm you might try some top water poppers.

The flats right in front of the park and just outside of Coffee Pot Bayou provide good fishing for trout and ladyfish. The marked channel out of Coffee Pot Bayou and the deep dredge holes along the western edge of the flat are good areas to try for redfish and snook. The docks, seawalls and mangroves in Coffee Pot are great habitat for snook and reds. Snook and mangrove snapper are known to frequent the rocky jetties and shorelines around the yacht basin and the airport. We will have different sized fly rods for members to cast. Tom Gadacz will provide casting tips and instructions. This was a real hit last time, and I hope that everyone will take a turn at casting 3-weights through 10 weight rods.

## Captain Nick Angelo: The Art of Feeding Fish on the Fly

What does "feeding fish" mean?

Captain Nick Angelo put it this way at the July meeting. Feeding fish means making an educated guess on where to place the fly and how to retrieve it to have the highest chance of getting a fish to bite.

In a series of slides, a guide who has paid his dues with many long days on the water, told it like it is for when you're fishing inshore for the grand slam – tarpon, redfish, snook, speckled trout.

Basics: You've got to learn where to place the fly. You have to know the kind of retrieve that gives you the highest chance of getting that fish to bite. Practice. Then practice some more.

Fly Fishing Technique: You must not slap or splash the water. Put the rod tip near the water and remove slack from the line. Spend some time watching how your fly looks in the water when you strip the line.

Fishing with a guide or a friend: Establish some common ground. A 40-foot cast. How far is that, actually.

Spotting the target: You can do some blind casting, some prospecting, but it's critical that you learn how to spot the fish. Look for

differences – shapes, colors, water pushes. Also, you must have good polarized glasses.

Prepare. Do your best. The memories last a lifetime. Most importantly, perhaps, have a great time.

In mid-July Orlando hosted what is probably the biggest sportfishing show in the world. And it's just for people in the biz – retailers, buyers, reps, and so forth.

IFTD was the fly fishing show at one end of the hall. ICAST was everything else, and it was huge.





### Tying Bench - Pencil Popper - tied by Layne Smith



Pencil Poppers have a justly deserved reputation for catching warm water predators in fresh or salt. Smitty will tie this fly at our August "Tieathon" meeting. Keep a couple in your fly box for all of our upcoming outings –St. Pete Urban Outing, Lake Maggiore, Hillsborough River, Weedon Island Preserve, and Fort DeSoto Park.

#### Materials

Hook: Lightning Strike popper hook size #2 - #4 Thread: Danville Flatwaxed Nylon white Tail: Pearl Krystal Flash (optional white marabou w/ Silver Krystal Flash) Body: Perfect Popper hard foam pencil popper

Eyes: Posted animal eyes or 3D molded eyes Cement: FletchTite Platinum Overcoat: Solarez UV Resin Misc: Red Sharpie marker, Mylar tubing sized to fit over popper body

#### **Tying Sequence**

Step 1: Place hook in vise and lay down a base wrap starting at hook bend and wrapping forward to an eyes width from hook eye. Wrap backward over base wrap to original tie-in point.

Step 2. Attach Pearl Krystal Flash or equal portions of marabou and silver Krystal Flash mixed together as tail.

Step 3. Measure foam body to hook. If need be, use thin file to widen slit in bottom of foam body to accommodate wrapped hook. NOTE: Skip this step if you are using a pre-drilled popper body.

Step 4. Coat base wraps with FletchTite and slide on popper body making sure it is aligned properly. For best results, try to end with hook eye close to the bottom side of popper (It imparts better casting and retrieval from the surface of the water).

Step 5. If you are using the slit-type popper bodies, fill in exposed gap with FletchTite and smooth out. Set aside to dry and start another if you are doing several.

Step 6. Optional choice is to slide Mylar tubing over body and stretch to form a taut layer over the popper body. Over coat this with UV Resin and cure, trimming frayed ends.

Step 7. If you choose, you can skip over step 6 and just overcoat plain popper body after you colored the head of the popper with the red Sharpie as shown in photo.

Step 8. Attach eyes, depending on which eye option you want (3D molded - apply with FletchTite, or posted eyes – trim post to half its length, poke hole in sides of popper head with heated bodkin, fill with FletchTite and insert post). Allow to dry. Then over-coat with UV Resin and cure.

## Bob Morrison: Fly Fishing Tips Plus One Fishy Factoid



### You might have to move about for the grand slam

**Got sand fleas?** -- In the surf, sand fleas are plentiful and fly imitations will take reds, sea trout, and snook as well as the occasional Spanish mackerel. Try at sundown low-tide or early morning high-tides.

**Fish the jetties** -- Flounders are working jetties and around structures. Try finger mullet patterns in 4-inch or longer sizes. Shrimp patterns also work here.

**Offshore bonanza** -- When fishing offshore, remember that blackfin tuna and king mackerel can be caught on flies. They seem to like combinations of red and

black colors. Try a Seaducer in these colors. These fish will be in deeper water, but can be brought up by chumming. They can also be caught on the surface with bugs and gurglers.

**Where are the snook?** -- Snook are in the passes and around structures, such as bridge columns. There are also some on nearby grassy flats. Greenback and other sardine patterns will bring them in as well as will pinfish and jigs with yellow tails. Over sandy bottoms, snook have been taking pink-and-white and chartreuse-and-white Clousers, as well as fly rod jigs in these same colors.

**Looking for redfish?** -- Redfish are around river mouths chasing bait fish up the creeks. They will take almost anything including swimming crabs on the surface, especially in the morning. Chartreuse colored bugs are also a good bet.

**Go for the grand slam** -- Tarpon are in water up to 20 feet deep and are schooling around holes and drop offs. Use bright mullet and ladyfish patterns; also swimming crabs.

**Ups and downs are a good thing** -- Finally, mangrove snappers are being taken on worm patterns, both in red and in tan-and-orange. These fish are 8 to 20 feet deep but they will come up for a fly that sinks and rises on the retrieve.

### Bob's Fishy Factoids

- The sea lamprey, that freshwater, slimy, eel-like predator on trout and other fish, has been found fossilized exactly like it looks today in 300 million year-old rocks. That's 100 million years before the dinosaurs came up. The lamprey spawns in freshwater and dies afterward. After hatching, young lampreys go to sea for a while, but come back to spawn and complete the life cycle. Otters, raccoons, and mink eat lamprey when they can catch them, which helps out the fish that lampreys attack in freshwater. Interesting.
- People in the USA, Canada, and Europe eat no less than 2 billion pounds of oysters every year.

## Capt. Pat Damico: Fly Casting Clinic. Tip #90



### **Stream Fishing? Learn "slack line" casting techniques** By Capt. Pat Damico, IFFF Master Casting Instructor

The fish in this river will only take a dry fly if you are positioned above them! When fishing for selective fresh water trout, this is a comment I frequently hear from fly fishers. The reason is that if directly above a fish facing you, the fly will be the first thing he sees as it drifts into his feeding zone. Heavily fished trout streams and rivers with stream bred larger fish that refuse floating offerings fall into this category, especially when in smooth water. Is this true? Yes, even when using the right fly if the presentation is flawed by casting over fish from below, lining them, having the fly land unnaturally, putting it in the wrong position, but mostly not being able to control, "drag." If your fly is floating differently than other small objects, like bubbles or small leaves, faster, slower or sideways, it will be refused. You must learn different slack line casts such as a reach cast, curve cast, pile cast, putting controlled large and small waves

in your cast at the proper location, etc. Our casting clinics deal with this and is another reason that you should take advantage of this club membership benefit.

## Tampa Bay Times : Captain's Corner

### **Redfish, trout, snook in locations you wouldn't normally find them** By Pat Damico, Tampa Bay Times correspondent

Stable weather conditions are usually necessary for consistent fishing success. That certainly has not been the case lately. During the summer, higher tides have redfish, trout and snook in areas that are high and dry during other times of the year. A good example is flooded mangroves, docks and other structure creating a place for fish to find food and feel secure, well-protected from overhead predators and bright sun. A bait fisherman will cast a live offering close to structure, and the unsuspecting baitfish will swim under the structure into the waiting mouth of a finny predator. With a fly rod, a cast must be made within inches of flooded mangroves and structure or back into narrow openings where fish can see or hear it. Use larger flies that cause a disturbance, often drawing fish to the edge of cover. A good choice are poppers in white, yellow or black that float and have a flat surface in front. A slight pull on a tight line creates a "pop," often bringing your intended quarry out of hiding to attack its dinner, resulting in violent, exciting surface action. Cast with the rod held vertically for pinpoint accuracy but move the rod horizontally to cast close to the water to get under structure. If floating grass is a problem, use flies with weed guards.

**Will you wet-wade the urban outing? --** On July 31 water quality was rated "good.". We should check it before the August 19 outing. BTW, if you don't want to get into the water you can also sight cast to fish from the seawall along St. Pete's North Shore Park. It's like standing on a poling platform, but more stable. **This fly reel only costs \$1300.** I saw this new Nautilus GTx reel on display at the recent International Fly Tackle Dealer show in Orlando. It holds up to 500 yards of 60# braid backing. You can apply up to 25 pounds of drag pressure because it has a carbon fiber drag on one side and a cork/Kevlar drag on the other side. That means when you tell the tarpon to stop, it does what it is told. If you are a guide with customers paying good money to catch the fish and the memory of a lifetime – tarpon, marlin, tuna, giant trevally -- this reel is a very good deal. (Venturing Angler)

**How to discourage boat sales** – You know those massive algae blooms we've been reading about? They're hurting the sale of new boats. (The Fishing Wire)

**Mangrove shorelines versus salt marsh shorelines** – And the winner is? Interesting study shows mangroves give much better coastal protection than the reedy salt marsh shorelines north of Pinellas County.
