What's wrong with these guys? NOTHING. Absolutely nothing. They are under the influence of a "force " that has affected men and women since the first cave man dangled a worm on a thorn, tied to a stick with a piece of sinew. (I just made that up :)

The difference here is: They were FLY fishing; an addictive, and artful, form of fish deceiving entertainment where you learn the basics at a morning casting clinic and the rest of your life trying to cast as smoothly as Dale Mazzarella or Pat Damico.

Just remember, the level of satisfaction is in direct proportion to the frustration. But those times when it all comes together, it is nothing but sweet. And, if I can tie flies and catch fish on 'em, anybody can. Never lose your sense of adventure.

Meet Hog Roast Speaker Chico Fernandez

Chico Fernandez has fly fished for over 40 years. He has broken several world records, most notably, the largest redfish taken with a fly rod, at 42 pounds, 5 ounces (I.G.F.A. record on 12-pound test tippet).

He was also one of the first (1980) to land a white marlin on a fly rod. Chico gets around. He has fished in most of the U.S., Alaska, Central America, South America, Cuba, Cayman Islands, Bahamas, Bermuda, New Zealand, Canada, Europe and others.

After working as an accountant and later Budget Director for Burger King Corp., he quit in 1974 to become involved in the outdoors field (articles, books, casting demonstrations, personal appearances, consulting and promoting).

His articles – more than 700 – have appeared in most major outdoor publication in U.S. and abroad (Japan,

Argentina, Spain and France). He wrote *The FisHair Saltwater Tying Guide, Fly Fishing for Bonefish and Fly-Fishing for Redfish*. The movie, "Chico and the Kids" (teaching kids how to fly fish) won the Outdoor Writers' Association of America's Award in 1980.

Chico has consulted for many national and international firms on fishing and fly fishing tackle, skiffs and canoe designs. He is a Charter member of the Board of Governors, Emeritus status, and a lifetime member of the International Federation of Fly Fishers; Director at Large of the Florida Council Board; Advisor to The Snook Foundation; founding member Bonefish & Tarpon Trust [BTT] and on their Board of Directors Advisory Council; and the IGFA [International Game Fish Association] Representative for Miami and lifetime member. He is also on the editorial board of MidCurrent. He is a consultant for Hell's Bay Boatworks (Titusville, FL) and Costa sunglasses (Daytona Beach). 




Cypress Point Park in Tampa. Launch your kayak or just wade in and fish. Apple Maps

How to measure fish for outings and the tournament



Total Length is measured from the most forward point of the head, with the mouth closed, to the farthest tip of the tail with the tail compressed or squeezed, while the fish is lying on its side.

Follow up to the FWC's January Snook Symposium

This is a follow up to the FWC Snook Symposium I attended January 13, 2016 in Orlando.

The FWC is interested in hearing and discussing stakeholder views on potential changes to snook management through a series of small group meetings on the Gulf and Atlantic coasts.

The 2015 snook stock assessment results indicate that the population is healthy and the FWC is soliciting potential management options that would improve angler satisfaction.

The plan is for each group to have an initial face to face meeting and then further participation in person or by phone and/or webinar. Five geographical locations have been identified:

St. Petersburg Fort Meyers Naples Melbourne West Palm Beach

The St. Petersburg meeting which I attended was held March 3 at the FWC's Fish and Wildlife Research Institute (FWRI) in downtown St. Petersburg on 8 Avenue SE. After a brief review of the data and discussions feedback from the Symposium was presented and the main four preferences for management goals on the Gulf coast were discussed:

Management goal of 40% spawning potential ratio (SPR) Harvestability (more fish to eat) Conserve nursery habitat An abundant population (for a higher catch rate)

We also discussed current regulations, the survey of supported management tools, and the survey of nonsupported management tools.

Our stakeholder group favored top management goals of establishing habitat preservation through education and a boat limit of two fish. Changes that would possibly affect SPR will be re-modeled by stock assessment biologists at the FWRI. There were some discussions among the attendees regarding the price of the snook stamp, increasing research funding, and closing the spring season that FWC staff documented.

Tying Bench SF Seatrout Baitfish ... Tied by Layne (Smitty) Smith



This is a pattern originated by a friend in Norway, Daniel Holm, that does well on seatrout. It is tied with Steve Farrar (SF) synthetic fibers which really breathe and look real in the water. Tie them small in the spring when the baitfish are small. Tie them larger for summer when the baitfish are larger. You can vary the colors, too, to better match the "hatch" – white bait (scaled sardines), greenbacks (threadfin herring) or even mullet. Weight it with lead wire, or not, to fish it at different depths.

Materials:

Hook: Partridge CS 54 #2 shrimp hook or Mustad 34011 #2. Thread: Danville Flat-waxed Nylon white or Clear Mono (medium). Wire: Tie in three strands of.020 lead wire. Skip this step for fishing shallow water. Belly: Tyer's favorite pearl dubbing like Gliss 'n Dub and Senyo to fish deeper. Skip for fishing shallow water. Body: Steve Farrar Blend Off White Flash: Silver Gliss 'n Glow or Flashabou Wing: Steve Farrar Blend Mackerel (or Camo, Mullet Brown, Olive or Tiers choice) Head: Pro Softhead size small or x-small or Fly Men's Fish Mask size #4 or #6 Eyes: 3D eyes to fit Softhead or fish mask Cement: CA Cement and Solarez UV Resin

Tying Instructions

Step 1. Attach thread behind hook eye and wrap back on shank approx. halfway. Tie down lead wire.

Step 2. Coat thread with dubbing and cover the lead wire.

Step 3. Take hank of belly material (about 1/8-inch thick when stretched) measure to twice hook length and tie in with several wraps an eyes-width behind hook eye. Fold over towards hook bend and tie down. Trim excess.

Step 4. At tie-in point, tie in three strands of flash to fly length and then fold over and tie down as in step 3. Trim excess.

Step 5. Take hank of wing material (slightly less than body material) and tie in the same as step 3 but don't fold it back and tie it down. Let excess hang out over hook eye for the time being. Whip finish and cut thread.

Step 6. Eyes may be attached to Softhead or fish mask at this time or you can put them on when fly is completed. Either way, attach with small drop of CA cement in eye recess on head.

Step 7. Fold back excess wing material and coat with UV Resin and slide head onto hook. Re-attach thread and tie in thread dam to hold head in place Coat eyes and cure head and eyes with UV lamp.

Step 8: Taper wing and belly to baitfish shape in length desired ... and GO FISH.

Schools of redfish in middle Tampa Bay

Rise and Shine -- Rising water temperatures are waking up the snook, and they are on the move. Find them in creek mouths and just upstream in the creeks, also near any structure.

Follow the mullet -- Look for snook at bridge pilings and abutments. Fish the incoming tides with bait fish imitation patterns. Watch for mullet schools. Snook will follow them as will redfish. Use small Merkin crab patterns, as well as Clousers in brown over yellow.

Slow down, you move too fast -- In moving water, try free-lining your fly, letting it drift much as you would a live bait fish. Keep slack almost tight so that

you can feel strikes.

Take up the slack -- Redfish will also follow mullet schools. Use bait fish patterns as well as small crab and shrimp to imitate these critters that the mullet stir up. Keep up slack as usual.

Capt. Pat Damico: Fly Casting Clinic. Tip #85



Still having trouble with a nice straight layout of your fly line?

When fishing and doing casting lessons, a good straight line layout from rod tip to fly is needed in most saltwater fishing situations. "Why do I get all those waves in my cast," I am often asked. There are a number of reasons why slack is present. We have discussed them in previous tips. If still having the problem, reach for the line behind the stripping guide and pull the line toward the reel as the fly touches the water. This will remove slack giving you a better line layout. It will allow you to feel what is going on with the fly, as in feeling a strike, and also impart proper action to it as you strip.

Low tides right for redfish on fly

Many fly fishers have fished Tampa Bay for a while, but haven't caught a redfish. Is catching reds here that difficult? "We used to practice on Tampa Bay redfish to catch bonefish in the Keys; now we practice on bonefish in the Keys to catch Tampa Bay Redfish," a famous quote from fly fishing legend, Lefty Kreh. Unless you can find some area that is rarely fished, you have your work cut out for you because of how often they are chased by everyone with a rod. Finding a concentration of reds and chumming them into action with stunned live bait is much different than sight fishing with a small fly and scoring. Search the shallows during the lowest tides. Find areas where wading fish eating birds are concentrated and feeding. As the tide comes in redfish will use the same locations looking for shrimp, crabs, crustaceans and baitfish. Watch every bird that flies close to the water as they will spook reds into showing themselves by disturbing the water near them. Fish push water ahead of them and this will alert you to their presence. Water always has a surface pattern; when disturbed by fish movement it gives a nervous appearance. When reds in the shallows feed on the bottom, their tail will frequently show and break the surface with a slow wave.

If you're under 65 you need a Florida saltwater fishing license and if you're going to keep a snook you'll need a snook permit, too. 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








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
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


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
