Our target fish is ladyfish This is the fly Bruce Evensen is recommending.




Smitty will tie the F-C Dart ladyfish fly at the August meeting.

July Club Meeting: Tampa Bay Watch is on the job

At the July meeting of Suncoast Fly Fishers, Andy Lykens, environmental scientist with Tampa Bay Watch, brought members up to date on all of TBW's programs to help keep the bay healthy.

TBW is hitting all the right buttons –seagrasses, oysters, shoreline vegetation – and the best of all may be the way TBW enlists volunteers to contribute thousands of hours to get the work done. Plus, Tampa Bay Watch is teaching and motivating the next generation to be lifelong stewards of Tampa Bay with field trips, summer camps, kayak eco-tours, and classroom boat excursions.

There's a lot of work to do: Tampa Bay is Florida's largest open water estuary encompassing nearly 400 square miles. More than 100 tributaries drain into the bay. And its surrounded by lots of people, lots of buildings, lots of fertilizer and wastewater runoff, dredging for shipping channels and more.

Lykens talked us through the slides and described all of the projects. Here are just some of the ways TBW is helping Tampa Bay get cleaner and clearer.

- Community seagrass planting.
- Building and installing oyster domes. Oysters are filter feeders. The more the elearer.
- Marine debris removal.
- Citizen awareness of storm-water runoff.
- Stabilizing shorelines with vegetation. TBW even arranges for some schools to maintain their own plant nurseries. Participating schools in St. Petersburg include Admiral Farragut Academy, Canterbury School of Florida, Lakewood High, and Shorecrest Preparatory.
- Monofilament fishing line recovery and recycling. TBW partners with Berkeley on that.
- Derelict crab trap removal

These programs are having a huge impact for the good. Tampa Bay seagrasses are back to 1950 levels.

Suncoast Fly Fishers is now considering more ways members can pull together to help Tampa Bay Watch do even more to make our fishing water healthier. And to catch more fish on the fly, of course.

Tying Bench - Smitty Ties Ed Story's F-C Dart



This fly was originated by Ed Story of Feather-Craft. He often stopped by Carl Hanson's on Tuesday night when he came to the Gulf Coast on fishing trips. It is a wingless Glass Minnow to surf-search for ladyfish. He designed this fly without a wing, so that by lowering the rod tip, the fly would sink and swim backwards. Its short Marabou tail and longer Flashabou tail strands simply folds over the fly body, as the fly is moved backwards by the lowering of the rod tip. On lifting the rod tip, the fly can again be stripped forward without the tail becoming tangled.

Materials:

Hook:TMC 9394 size 4-2 (size 2 shown) or Mustad 34011 Thread: Danville Flatwaxed Nylon in white or grey Tail: Sparse white marabou extending 1" behind hook bend Flash: 15 strands of Flashabou (Salt & Pepper) extending 1½" behind hook bend Under-body: Size wide Silver Mylar Tinsel Over-body: F-C Clear Wide-Lace material or substitute wide D-rib in clear Head: A build-up of tying thread, large enough to add decal eyes Eyes: Decal eyes in white, yellow, red, or gold in size small Gills: Red Flatwaxed Nylon wrapped at rear of fly head just behind eyes Overcoat: UV Resin, SHHAN or your favorite head cement

Tying Sequence:

1. Attach your thread in at the bend of the hook and secure with a few half hitches. Tie in a sparse white Marabou tail 1" long. Tie in 15 strands of Salt & Pepper Flashabou to extend 1½" backward from hook bend. Tie in a strand of silver Mylar Tinsel about 5' or so long and let hang. Next tie in a 6" strand of the clear F-C clear Wide-Lace by first prepping it by cutting one end in a long pointed taper (makes it easier to tie in)

2. With everything tied in at the bend, use the tying thread to build up and taper the area in front the tie in spot so there is no "bulge" showing from the tail material. Taper and run your thread up the hook shank in close wraps to just behind the hook eye. Wrap the Mylar Tinsel forward in overlapping turns to the waiting thread. This tinsel will later show through the clear lace to create the "silver sides" of the Glass Minnow.

3. Wrap the Wide-Lace up the hook shank in close touching wraps, forming the Glass Minnow body. On reaching the tying thread, tie in the Wide-Lace with a number of wraps to secure it. Cut off excess lace. Continue to wrap thread over lace forming a fly head large enough to accept small-size decal eye. (The thread "fly head" can be carefully flattened on the sides using smooth flat-jaw bench pliers).

4. Place decal eyes on either side of fly head. Overcoat eyes with a thin coat of Resin and cure. With red thread, make a number of thread wraps behind eyes to represent gills. Overcoat these thread wraps as well as the eyes with a build-up of resin to create a nice head. Cure with UV Light (or set flies outside and let the sun cure them for you).

Tying Bench -Bruce's Evensen's take on the Gartside Gurgler

Bruce Evensen led fly tiers with the step-by-steps for the ever popular Gartside Gurgler at his home/fly studio on July 26. Bill Scarola took notes (and a picture of his flies) and submitted the materials and tying sequence. Thanks, Bill

Materials

Hook: Size 1 or 1/0 Stinger

Tail: Color of choice. Pick any one – bucktail, Steve Farrar, Craft Fur, or EP Fibers.

Underbody: Chenille to match the color of the tail.

Body: Foam, color of choice

Flash: Add flash if not using Steve Ferrar, as it has its own flash

Eyes: Stick-on, or bubble eyes with stems. Or Magic Marker.

Thread: Flat wax color to match the foam

Tying Sequence

Wrap thread from hook eye to bend.

Tie-in tail material just in front of hook point on shaft.

Tie in foam at end of tail material so foam hangs backward over hook end. Note that it'll be pulled forward and later secured just behind the hook eye. Foam should be cut into strips about ¼" to 3/8" wide, and about 2" long depending on hook size.

Add flash if desired

Now, tie in chenille. Tie it off in front of the foam at the top of the tail material. Add glue here to hold material in place then bring thread forward toward hook eye. Leave a ¼"space behind the hook eye to tie off the foam. Wrap chenille forward, tie if off, and add a dab of glue

Bring Foam forward leaving a hump over chenille material, place a few thread wraps to anchor form ahead of Chenille then bend foam back on itself to form small bubble over hook eye and tie off as pictured. Add eyes, and glue in or color sides of the head of the foam red and or black to simulate eyes. Also don't forget to add glue to thread wraps that form head!

Option: Add stripes to tail material with magic marker...keep it an odd number of stripes, 5 or 7 depending on length of tail.

Fly Fishers International at the World's Largest Fly Fishing/Sportfishing Trade Show

ICAST, short for International Convention of Allied Sportfishing Trades, is the world's largest sportfishing trade show. It's a summer showcase for the latest innovations in fishing gear, accessories and apparel, much of it gear that consumers will see in fishing shops in 2019.

American Sportfishing Association (ASA) is the organization behind ICAST. American Fly Fishing Trade Association (AFFTA) partners with ASA and puts on the fly fishing portion, called IFTD, short for International Fly Tackle Dealers. ICAST/IFTD is an annual event and for the last three years it has been held at the Orange County Convention Center in Orlando. Next year, the fly fishing part of the show will be held in Denver.

This year's show was July 10 -13 and more than 600 exhibitors occupied the entire South Course Exhibit Hall. The majority of exhibitors displayed conventional tackle and accessories. Fly fishing exhibitors were located in the northeast area of the Hall around two water casting pools. Related activities included fly tying and casting competitions, seminars on many aspects of fly fishing and meetings of various industries and recreational organizations. The goal of all participants was to encourage more public participation in fishing and balance this with sound resource management of our public lands, waters and fisheries.

This is the third year for FFI to participate in the event. Our FFI exhibit was located at the end of one of the casting pools, and many visited the booth to talk about FFI programs. Some were already FFI members and a few joined as new FFI members. Topics of discussion typically were of how other organizations might collaborate with FFI on conservation and education programs, how to improve membership recruitment and retention, how to assist with fly tying and casting instruction for Boy Scouts of America, and how to prepare for FFI's Casting Instructor Certification programs.

The FFI Exhibit this year was a new design that consisted of three tall panels of information and great photos and flanked with two sails, one that displayed our new logo boldly and the other our new Learning Center.

We managed about an hour of casting to hula hoops and then moved inside because of a lightening alert. A short video on fly casting and loop formation by Mel Krieger concluded the session. All participants received the SFF Certificate of Completion for the Junior Training

Future Fly Fishers at E.G. Simmons Park in Ruskin

The E. G. Simmons Regional Park Fish Camp in Ruskin, Florida offers a two week experience learning fishing skills to campers. Suncoast Fly Fishers, a FFI Charter Club and member of the Florida Council, participates in the program by providing fly casting instructions to youths of the older age group,



12 to 15 years of age. We had 32 anglers at this session and over the past five years the number of girls in each class has increased.

The youth fly casting sessions were staffed by SFF members Rick Warfel, SFF Vice-president; David Redd, Bill Scarola, and Tom Gadacz. We wish to thank E.G Simmons Director Matt Wynn and staff members Dan, Audrey, Jesse, and Amanda for their assistance.



Most of the time is spent fly casting. We have a brief classroom session explaining fly fishing equipment and techniques and showing them different kinds of flies. The kids are paired up and help each other. The casting stroke is demonstrated using the paint brush drill. They dip a paint brush in a bowl of water and, starting at ear level ad with as little wrist movement as possible, they splash their partner who is 6 to 8 feet in front to them.

The kids practice the paint brush drill for 30 minutes.

The instructors move among each pair giving praise and a few instructions. Then they cast with 5 weight 8' 6" fly rods. They cast to Hula hoop targets 30 to 35 feet away. The non-casting partner observes and reinforces

the elements of the casting stroke. Avoiding rotation of the wrist is the greatest initial challenge.

We concluded the session reviewing a video on the techniques of the casting stroke and casting loop. Every youth received a SFF Certificate of Completion of having completed the Junior Training for Fly Casting.

We had another fly casting session at E. G. Simmons Park on July 24 with 22 youths. The weather was a



bit threatening but cleared by 1 pm for our 2-hour session. They also did well acquiring basic fly casting skills and received the SFF Certificate as a Junior Training for Fly Casting.

July took Cindy and me through the Blue Ridge and Smokey Mountains by way of Virginia, North Carolina and then Tennessee.

We finally got to use and rely on the "air brakes" in the bus. One tap on the pedal and the rig entered into a controlled deceleration. It was nice and I quickly got rid of the "white knuckle" syndrome. I now have more confidence that I can navigate the big western mountains in this 41-foot motor coach. The 450 HP Cummins diesel engine did a nice job pushing us up and over every

mountain.

The Creekwood Farm RV Park is located in the Blue Ridge Mountains on a heritage trout steam known as Jonathan Creek, where I proudly landed my first brownie on a pheasant tail midge dropper.

In the Smokey's I was able to fish the national park where it has not been stocked for decades and is therefore full of very smart trout. The crew at Little River Outfitters in Townsend claims that the Smokey Mountain trout streams are some of the most technically challenging

in the country. They also warned that it isn't uncommon to come across copperheads and timber rattlers along the streams. It was here I landed my first rainbow on the Middle Prong Little River near Tremont using a Green Weenie dropper.

"I have been fishing with my new TFO Mangrove 6-weight rod with a beautiful burled wood handle made by Alan Sewell who, as usual, did a very nice job."

Wow! I felt like a fish out of water. With no trout fishing experience I read, watched YouTube videos, talked to some of you and visited fly shops. I had to navigate dry flies, streamers, nymphs and midges. I needed new tackle like floatant, split shot and lightweight leader and tippet. I learned about "droppers," high sticking, and mending.

Boy, do I have plenty to learn. As an example, it literally took me 20 minutes to tie the first dry fly-dropper rig.

For me it was nearly impossible to thread 5x tippet through the eye of the files I was using, some smaller than my pinky fingernail. Despite all of this, I can see why trout fishing is fun and I plan to educate myself and focus on it as we continue our travels.

Capt. Pat Damico: Don't forget about fishing freshwater ponds



Saltwater gets all of our attention, but when driving to and from work or visiting a friend, keep an eye out for a pond that looks fishy. There are many productive ponds that have bass and panfish, some even have snook and baby tarpon, both of which adapt well to freshwater. You're okay to fish on public land, but if privately owned, seek permission. Keep a rod rigged in the vehicle. An SUV can accommodate a fully rigged fly rod, or you can have it in two sections in a protective case in the trunk. Park your car in a safe place and observe the pond's surface for activity. A small pair of binoculars is helpful. Most fish will be around structure, trees, floating plants, docks, bridges or an aerator. On a sunny day,

shade is the key. In the absence of structure, cast close to shore where most food sources such as hoppers, crickets, ants, beetles and baitfish are plentiful. Splashes will give away feeding activity. A 4- or 5-weight fly rod with a floating weight-forward line using a 7-foot leader tapered to 8-pound test will handle easily and allow you to find if any fish are present. Use flies that imitate small baitfish and terrestrials or use a white or yellow popper in sizes 6-8 and cover water quickly. If you find fish too small for your equipment or too large, adjust gear to be better prepared on your return visit.

Layne Smith - Strolling the Surf-Line with Ed Story

"Strolling" the surf is a method Ed Story began years ago to attract ladyfish. He would wade the surf parallel to the beach in the clear waters of the Gulf.

He would wade with the rod over his shoulder, and 35 to 40 feet of line and leader out. As he waded, the sand would swirl a bit forming a "chum-line". First to follow were small baitfish along the surf. Next in line would be the ladyfish and they would hit the Surf Dart.

After releasing the first ladyfish, he would cast back to the area behind him. Oftentimes he would instantly pick up another ladyfish or some other "minnow-chaser"!

Just make sure if you try this method DO THE STINGRAY SHUFFLE.














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














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
