


No meeting in December



Dave Olson Wins Big Gun Shootout with 116-Foot Fly Cast

Team Juice – Dave Choinard, Zach Judd, Greg Peterson – wins combined distance and accuracy contest

The Tampa Bay Fly Fishing Club organized and hosted the annual event at Picnic Island Park

Dave Olson won the long distance trophy at the 2018 Big Gun Shootout with a cast of 116 feet and one inch. And Dave Choinard won first place overall for his combined distance and accuracy scores. His long cast was 107 feet, 10 inches. *Team Juice* – Choinard, Zach Judd, and Greg Peterson – came in first with the highest distance/accuracy score of 1217, a tad above the second place team -- *Disheveled* –made up of Olson, Eric Davis, and Nick Angelo. The *Reactive Shooters* team of Leigh West, Brandon Chiacop and Bryon Chamberlin took third place. Bryon Chamberlin's long cast was quite long – 114 feet, 2 inches – and earned him a tie for third place with Eric Davis for combined distance and accuracy.

The Suncoast Fly Fishers team (SFF-A) of Quin Berry, Andy Constantinou and Rick Warfel placed eighth.

FFI Chairman Tom Logan Speaks to Suncoast Fly Fishers

Fly Fishers International's commitment to the future of fly fishing was the subject of a presentation by Tom Logan, Chairman of Fly Fishers International at the SFF November meeting.

Logan explained that the fifty-three-year-old organization with 12,000 members is dedicated to preserve and protect fly fishing opportunities for future generations through conservation and education. FFI supports all type of fly fishing including cold water, warm water and salt water.

From the conservation standpoint, FFI partners with over 55 other conservation-minded organizations to review and comment on environmental issues world-wide. "We comment on quite a few environmental issues that come before government bodies. Many are associated with the Clean Water Act, the Endangered Species Act or on mining issues", said Logan. "Our partnerships with other organizations, most of which are not fishing-oriented, help us stay

on top of important conservation issues and allows us to have a large collective voice."

FFI supports local conservation efforts with seed grants that can lead to large initiatives. They also offer conservation scholarships and internships to deserving students.

"Our educational committee has designed the FFI Learning Center which provides a range of educational and training materials for fly fishing enthusiasts," said Logan. FFI offers a range of courses that can be downloaded from the FFI site as well as an extensive library of 300-400 training videos for member education.

FFI also works closely with Project Healing Waters which is dedicated to the physical and emotional rehabilitation of disabled active military service personnel and disabled veterans through fly fishing and associated activities by supplying casting and fly-tying instructors. Recently FFI has begun an instructor training program.

FFI's "Women's Connect" program offers outreach to women's conservation organizations inviting them to become associated with FFI. Recently FFI introduced a Guides and Outfitter's Program. The program offers guides and outfitters attractive insurance programs. "We want to attract guides to FFI to encourage them to spread the word about FFI to the 6.5 million fly fishers out there," said Logan.

Another FFI initiative is targeted to fly fishing equipment manufactures. The goal is to seek support for FFI educational and conservation programs from fly fishing equipment manufacturers.

Locally FFI works with Florida-based conservation groups such as the Florida Conservation Coalition and the Theodore Roosevelt Conservation Lobbyists to comment on conservation issues important to Florida fly fishers.

Preview: December 8 Outing, Fort DeSoto Park

It is time once again for our annual Don Coleman Invitational at Fort De Soto Park. We celebrate this annual event with fly fishing, storytelling, and our annual "Chili Cook-off".

I am looking forward to fishing Fort De Soto Park now that the Red Tide has receded. This location provides plenty of areas to wade-fish, fish from your kayak, or fish from your boat. Lunch is at Shelter #1. (Shelter #1 is the last pavilion on your left heading north on the main road. Visit the park's website.)

For this outing our targeted fish is the longest of any of the Annual Tournament Species: spotted seatrout, redfish, snook, or ladyfish. But your catch that exceeds the length of any of the tournament species (see below) could win the annual tournament. BUT ... you must shoot a picture of it.

Capt. Ray Markham: Guidelines for fishing Fort DeSoto

Baitfish continue on the flats despite bouts with red tide. Mullet have also been around as well and traveling with the mullet you may find some redfish. Mullet imitations 3 to 4inches long will work well here, as do crab patterns if you are fishing around oyster bars. Deeper holes back by the maintenance shack are holding some trout, but as lately, dependent on the presence of red tide. Glass minnow patterns or Carl Hanson's bend back glass minnow will be weedless. Snook continue in the holes and an influx of a few sheepshead are noted here. Flounder have been more prevalent in the past couple of weeks, hanging wherever there is some moving water and sand/mud/grass bottom. Killifish patterns tied in Clousers work.

Tying Bench - Layne Smith Ties Don Coleman's Nearly Live Bait Fly

Fly of the month for the Don Coleman Memorial -- Fort DeSoto Park outing. The Nearly Live Bait fly is a very popular and productive fly. This fly has even out-fished live whitebait on a charter captain's boat. It can be tied in any color and colored with markers to imitate any type of baitfish. This fly has caught too many species to list. It is even great on largemouth bass.



Materials

Hook: Size 2 to 2/0 Eagle Claw 254ss, L067S or Gamakatsu SC15

Thread: Clear mono Thread

Tail: Krystal Flash pearl or UV Pearl

Wing/Belly: Neerhair Polar Bear, EP Fibers or Congo Hair in white

Flash: Angel Hair (sparse)

Eyes: 3D Prism Eyes or posted animal eyes (trimmed)

Adhesives: Super Glue and FletchTite

Top Color: Chartpak Waterproof marker. (choice of color)

Tying Sequence

Step 1: Tie on about 12 strands of Krystal Flash doubled over at the rear of the hook just before the bend.

Step 2: Tie on a 2" clump of white Neerhair (at mid-point) over the Krystal Flash, and then double the front portion under, tying it down. Put a drop of super glue on that tie in spot.

Step 3: Wrap the thread about 3/16 of an inch forward again this time put all the materials on the top of the hook like a high tie.

Step 4: At the same point as step 3, tie on the white to the bottom side of the hook in a low tie style.

Step 5: Wrap the thread about 3/16 of an inch forward and repeat step 3 and 4 and then tie on some Angel Hair to the sides of the fly for flash.

Step 6: Repeat step 3 and 4 at the eye of the hook and finish off the head.

Step 7: Trim the fly to a high profile minnow shape. Color as desired with markers.

Step 8: Stick on the 3D Prism Eyes (or trimmed posted eyes) with FletchTite.

Materials

Thread: flat-waxed, red or green

Bucktail: red and olive or red and bright green

Flash: red and green Bead chain eyes

Tying Sequence

Step 1: Wrap thread from hook eye to point

Step 2: Add buck tail, add half of matchstick of red, then green, tie in in front of hook bend above hook point.

Step 3. Add several strands of red and green Flashabou on top and to sides of the bucktail.

Step 4: Add bead chain eyes, tie in just behind hook eye!!!

Step 5: Tie in one piece of each color of Estaz or chenille about 1 1.5" long. Place them at the midpoint of the hook shank; i.e. on top of the bucktail material, then bring the thread forward. Before palmering, twist the two stands together to form one strand. Palmer forward ending at bead chain eyes. You can bring the Estaz over the eyes if desired.

Step 6: Whip-finish Estaz material at the hook eye. and add several drops of glue.

1/2 teaspoon Dijon mustard

1/2 teaspoon Old Bay seasoning

1/4 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

1 pinch cayenne pepper

(or more to suit your taste)

1 egg, beaten

Salt to taste

One pound fresh or canned crabmeat

Panko bread crumbs.

Cooking instructions

- 1. Mix first 8 ingredients in a large bowl.
- 2. Stir in crabmeat until mixture is combined and place in refrigerator for at least one hour.
- 3. Shape chilled crab mixture into 4 patties.
- 4. Coat completely with panko bread crumbs.
- Melt butter in a skillet and cook patties for about 4 minutes on each side over medium-heat.
