

Bruce Evensen's garage is our new fly-tying studio






Bruce Evensen has converted his 4-car garage into a fly tying studio for members of Suncoast Fly Fishers.




Mark Hays: 2 of 13





One of the many benefits we receive as members of the Suncoast Fly Fishers is the fun of participating in monthly outings and annual contests for catching the longest fish. The goals of these "contests" are to promote camaraderie and to add enjoyment to our outings. The contests are all in good fun and the prizes rewarded are of nominal value.

However, the main objective of having these contests is to support the mission of our club and to promote fly fishing by sharing information and experiences with all of our members, thereby helping them to become better fly fishers. Our members appreciate any opportunity to learn about new places to fish and which flies to use.

In the spirit of meeting these goals and objectives, and of always improving our club and giving back to our members, we are updating our monthly and annual contest rules. I hope that all of you will continue to participate and look at these changes as another way to be good citizens of our club.

- To submit an entry to the longest fish contests, we are asking for a photo and a brief update on the fly used so that this information can be shared in our newsletter. These should be emailed to Bob Burkard at <u>robertburkard9@gmail.com</u>.
- You can also provide more information if you choose, but this is optional. Examples are where you were fishing, tide conditions, or any additional information that would interest our members. Again, this is to share with our members.
- We will continue to follow the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's guidelines for measuring the length of fish caught. To keep things simple, we use the *Total Length Measurement* method for all fish. Total length is measured from the most forward point of the head, with the mouth closed, to the farthest tip of the tail with the tail compressed or squeezed, while the fish is lying on its side.







Tying Bench Layne Smith Ties the Golden Shiner

This is the fly to use to catch the biggest bass at our Walsingham Park Lake outing.

Materials

Hook: Mustad R75/ 79580 Streamer hook size #2 or your favorite 4X long streamer hook.

Tag: Black Holographic Mylar Tinsel

Body: Gold Braided Tinsel and Yellow Floss

Belly: White Bucktail (sparse)

Wing: 4 wide Yellow Neck Hackle (2 each from right and left side of cape)



Smitty's fly of the month: Golden Shiner

Cheek: Pheasant Church Windows . Prep cheek feathers with SHHAN spray fixative and let dry before placing them on fly.

Throat: Red over Yellow Schlappen

Head: Black Flatwaxed Nylon Thread

Overcoat: Solarez UV Resin

Tying Sequence

1. Attach yellow floss at rear of hook shank and attach black mylar tinsel. Wrap floss back over tinsel to slightly over hook bend and then return floss to tie in point with smooth even wraps. Wrap black tinsel forward in smooth even wraps to tie in point, tie off with floss and trim off excess mylar.

2. On bottom of hook shank, tie in tag end of braided tinsel so butt-end of tinsel is pointing toward hook eye and remainder of tinsel is hanging over hook bend. Proceed to wrap floss forward, in smooth even-touching wraps to about ¼" from hook eye. Lock in place with a couple of half-hitches and cut off excess.

3. Wrap braided tinsel forward in evenly spaced open wraps to the floss tie off point. Attach black head thread and tie off braid securing it with a few half-hitches. Remove excess braid.

4. Using black head thread, tie in sparse white bucktail belly so that it extends about $\frac{1}{2}$ " past hook bend. Secure in place with SHHAN spray.

5. Take the four yellow neck hackle feathers placing them paired so the concave (or dull sides face each other and they curve properly down over bend of hook. Before attaching the four feathers, flatten stems parallel to hook shaft so feathers will not "roll" out of position. Secure with SHHAN.

6. Prep** and attach "church window" cheeks on both sides. Secure with SHHAN.

7. Strip barbules from a yellow neck hackle and attach on underside of hook as a throat. Repeat process with barbules from a red neck hackle. Secure with SHHAN.

8. Use black flatwaxed nylon for a smooth head for the fly. Overcoat with UV Resin and cure with UV light.

Tying Bench Dennis Marquis ties the Gummy Minnow



I bought a few gummy minnows at Bill Jackson's and had success so I decided to tie some myself. I could not find the body materials locally, so I ordered D's Flyes Crystal Skin (thin) from Casters Online Fly Shop. The south side of Indian Key has been consistently productive for seatrout, small jacks and other species using small bait pattern flies on incoming and outgoing tides. The gummy minnow has worked the best. I found a hole that was so clear I could see the trout coming up to strike the fly.

Materials

- Hook: #1/0 #06 Tiemco 811S
- .025 lead wire
- Thread: White 100 Denier Veevus GSP
- Body: Pearlescent Thin Crystal Skin or Sili Skin
- Back: Moss Green Thin Crystal Skin or Sili Skin
- Eyes: Super Pearl 3/16" Stick On Eyes or 4mm Living Eyes
- Overcoat: Clear Thin Crystal Skin or Sili Skin
- Glue: Loon Hard Head



Step 3: Cut and shape Thin Crystal Skin

Tying Sequence

1. Wrap lead around the hook shank starting from point of hook forward 10 wraps. Cover lead completely with thread, securing it on both ends. No glue is needed.

2: Using the Pearlescent Thin Crystal Skin for the body, cut a 2" long piece about 5/8" wide. Cut a slight taper from front to back on each side. Remove protective backing exposing sticky side, and fold sticky side down evenly over both sides of hook shank covering wrapped lead. Notice the body is placed on an angle to the hook. Squeeze body together working out air bubbles as needed. Scissor belly and tail to proper shape.

3. Using the Moss Green Thin Crystal Skin for the back, cut a 2" long piece about 3/8" wide. Cut a slight taper from front to back on each side. Remove protective backing exposing sticky side, and fold sticky side down evenly over top of body. Squeeze body and back together working out air bubbles as needed. Trim as needed to make it line up to the body tail edge.

4. Add eyes on each side using a dab of your favorite glue.

5. Using the clear Thin Crystal Skin to cover the whole fly, cut a 2" long piece about 6/8" wide. No taper is needed. Remove protective backing exposing sticky side, and fold sticky side down evenly over entire body. Squeeze body, back and whole fly cover together working out air bubbles as needed. Trim away excess as needed for shape. NOTE: It seals better if you let the clear to extend pass the body at all points, it sealed better.

6. Finish fly by starting thread behind eye and slowly work over material in front of eye over top and bottom of head to "squeeze" material to a softer point. When done, whip finish. Trim fly to desired appearance and cut off any extra material. You could apply some of your favorite glue along the seam that traverses the bottom of the fly.

Bob Morrison: How-To Tips and Fishy Factoids



Editor's note: Our How-To and Fishy Factoid guru took a fall in December and spent a few days in the hospital, then a few more days in rehab. He's back at home now, back in action and it's almost full-steam ahead.

1. Look for inland bridges and passes to jetties. These will start to load up with sheepshead. Shrimp and crab flies re working. Make the trips necessary to find productive docks with hiding places for fish.

Docks that work at night will, when lit, tend to fish well in the daytime hours. But the fish will tend to spread out a bit after the sun comes up.

- 2. Not our thing, but chumming with barnacles scraped from dock pilings will also bring them in.
- 3. Go docklight fishing for better results when the wind is high outside but quieter inside. Shrimp patterns will work here. Try to find places that have less wind.
- 4. Water temperatures are slowly rising so fish are moving more freely. Fish are hitting at Fort De Soto Park all the way to the main channel in St. Joseph Sound. Look for area with grassy bottoms.
- 5. Trout are congregating in deeper, quieter water. Cooler waters hold more fish in the channels around the passes.

6. Overcast days will send trout to the bottom in the middle of the canals. Try shad-tail flies and jigs on a spinning rod to locate fish more quickly.

7. Creeks are holding sheepshead preparing to spawn in the creek-head narrows. They also will be congregating around structures all around the bay.

Spey Casting: A change of direction roll cast

While attending the Fly Fishing Show in Edison, NJ, the largest in the world, I visited with Simon Gawesworth at his booth before his wonderful 45-minute casting demonstration which dealt with using spey techniques with a single handed rod. I told him how his video's dealing with this subject meant so much to me, especially when fishing a stream for fresh water trout. There are many places in saltwater where a very long fly rod is a disadvantage, a flats boat being one of them, but an understanding of the technique can help you in wade fishing or where a conventional back cast is not possible. Spend some time researching this subject, it will make you a much better fly fisher.

Tampa Bay Times : Captain's Corner

Conditions a challenge or fly fishermen

Small baitfish, especially glass minnows, will be in canals and well-protected areas, especially where the sun can warm the darker bottom. This means an early start, even with a moving tide, will not be productive. Seawalls and wooden structure such as docks and boats with large hulls absorb heat, inviting fish to stay close. Our low tides are early, so bankers' hours might be in order for reds and trout. A water thermometer is a necessity. If your boat is not equipped with one, get an inexpensive pool thermometer. Seek the warmest places. On the shallow grass flats, fish will be in sand holes, improving sight-fishing opportunities. Probe these with well-placed casts allowing your baitfish, shrimp or crab fly to sink to the bottom, then start a slow retrieve. A large sand hole should be fished carefully, especially if few are present. A smooth surface with no wind might help casting, but larger fish will spook more easily. A ripple on the surface will get you closer to fish.

Keys. The first question to ask is, who owns this boat? Answers don't come easy. Then, the removal. It's hard work; time-consuming, too. (The Fishing Wire)

Look out below, chapter 2 – In early January a team of 15 observers from 10 organizations estimated the number of manatees in Florida waters at 6,131 They counted 3,731 manatees on Florida's east coast and 2,400 manatees on the west coast. Manatees are doing well. (The Fishing Wire)

Well, they do call mangroves "walking trees" – So this high schooler, on her own, figured out how to track the growth or decline of mangrove and other forests with satellites. A couple of NASA scientists learned about her work and they hired her. Two years on she has built an early warning system for mangrove and other forests using four satellites. Mangroves appear to be on the march in the Tampa Bay area, imho. I hope I'm right. (Jewish World Review)

Smell something? Say something. – Think you're smelling the red tide algae? Then report it on your smart phone. Yeah, now there's an APP that tells Sarasota's Mote Marine Laboratory where you are and where it is. Then Mote can deploy a little, unmanned yellow submarine – *Waldo*– that goes to the location and determines the type and size of the algae bloom and helps Mote and its partners determine the best response. Red tide algae (Karenia brevis) sometimes blooms out of control and its toxins kill fish, shellfish, mammals and birds. The new Mote CSIC app – CSIC is short for Citizen Science Information Collaboration – is for Android and iOS mobile phones. (Mote Marine Laboratory)

Impressive. -- Breaking news from Mote Marine. (Bradenton News)

Do you hear drums? Correct. Those are black drums. – If you want to catch a big black drum on the fly this is the time of the year. Sport Fishing magazine spells it out for us with how-to insights from Captain Ray Markham who, by the way, is a Suncoast Fly Fisher. "You can hear them [drumming] 100 feet away. It's a crazy thing," says Ray. (Sport Fishing)

Hurry, here come the cops –FWC officers saw this "angler" on the North Sunshine Skyway Fishing Pier and they reported that when he spotted them he started stuffing fish down a storm drain. He had so many he started throwing them into the water, instead. Undersized mangrove snappers, it would appear. Not good. FWC's weekly report is always a fun read. (MyFWC)






