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
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#### SFF President Letter - June 2018

Fishing for snook is the largest snook, but keep in mind that we still need a redfish entry for the annual contest. Also please report ladyfish over 14 inches and seatrout over 18.5 inches.

### Markham: Tips for Fly Fishing Docklights and Beaches

When fishing beaches or dock lights for snook it's always best with good water movement. New and full moon weeks are prime times. Snook will hammer bigger baits on the beaches during the summer spawning months, but get picky around dock lights. Fish the perimeter of the lights with shrimp or #2 to #4 glass minnow patterns like Carl

Hansen's Mono-body Glass Minnow, or Grassett's Snook Minnow about 2 to 2  $\frac{1}{2}$  inches long sparsely tied in white with pearl crystal flash. Beach sight fishing is best after the sun is up enough to show fish where the surf meets sand.



## Tying Bench - "BA" Baitfish tied by Layne Smith,



BA is short for B@# A\$\$. This is a versatile fly that works on docklights, beaches, or just about anywhere fish feed on white bait (threadfin herring. This BA fly can be tied in darker colors for fishing back country or stained waters. Tan and orange work for redfish. For docklights tie it in white. Make it black and purple for tarpon which are often looking up so a darker fly is more visible against a bright background.

#### Materials:

Hook: Daiichi 3111 #1/0 or your favorite heavy wire octopus hook

Thread: Danville Flatwaxed Nylon white

Belly: Extra-Select Marabou tanTail: Ostrich Herl white

Wing: Extra-Select Marabou yellow Body/Head: 3" EP Foxy Brush White

Eyes: ¼" Jurassic Eyes

Cement: Fletch-Tite and SHHAN Finish Coat: Solarez UV Resin






#### **Tying Sequence:**

- **1.** Insert hook in vise and tie in base wrap from hook eye to just above hook barb.
- **2.** Tie in tan belly marabou  $1 1\frac{1}{2}$ " long and secure with several thread wraps.
- 3. Attach 25 to 30 Ostrich Herls at same tie-in point. Herl should be 2½" to 3" long and should extend backward just past marabou. Secure with tapered thread wraps.
- 4. Tie in an equal amount of yellow wing marabou as the tan belly marabou at the same tie-in point as the other feathers and secure again with tapered thread wraps sandwiching the herl tail between the two marabous. Whip finish and coat tapered thread wraps with UV Resin.
- **5.** Tie in Foxy Brush right where marabou and Ostrich stops. Attach hackle pliers and palmer forward remembering to stroke back material as you go keeping overwrap to a minimum. Continue all the way to hook eye securing with a whip finish.
- **6.** Take bodkin and pick out any overwrapped fibers.
- 7. Attach eyes with Fletch-Tite and coat thread wraps with UV Resin and cure.

# Tying Bench – Tie some Ken Hofmeister Ada Potato Flies (Oh, and about those polyester fiber materials...)



We'll remember Ken Hofmeister for many things. One is the fly he created, Ada Potato. He was inspired to craft this fly while watching Ada, his three-year-old granddaughter, playing with her toy duster. The duster had fine green and blue polyester fibers. The finished fly works great on trout and ladyfish day or night. Ken's Ada Potato was the Tying Bench fly in the August, 2008 issue of *On The Fly*. The hardest part is getting the same materials in the proper colors since Ada's toy duster no longer exists. Well, be resourceful

#### **Materials**

- Hook: Mustad 3407 DT Size 4 sharpened
   Tail: Blue and green duster polyester fiber material 3 inches long, one strand each of fiberglass cloth and peacock herl. Either white, yellow, or pink 2-inch buck tail or hackle.
- Metallic braid.
- Flash: Orvis blue Flashabou.
- Thread: Danville flat-waxed nylon in yellow, white, or pink.
- Eyes: Bead chain or 5/32 brass eyes.

#### **Ken's Tying Instructions**

- 1. First, be sure your granddaughter doesn't see the desecration and mutilation of her cherished toy.
- 2. Pinch down barb and sharpen hook before securing it in vise and attaching thread from eye to bend of hook. Half hitch helps here.
- 3. Select a *sparse* amount of green and blue polyester fibers and place on top of hook with one end extending up to the eye. Attach to hook at bend. Attach a single strand of fiberglass cloth and peacock herl to top of hook at the bend. Select three strands of Flashabou and fold over thread at mid-point and secure to hook with several wraps of thread.
- 4. Fold excess material from eye of hook over bend of hook and tie securely.
- 5. Rotate hook and tie *very sparse* 2-inch yellow, white, or pink buck tail or hackle flat against the hook shank on underside of hook.
- 6. Position bead chain or 5/32-brass eye against material near bend of hook against the folded excess material and tie on.
- 7. Wrap metallic braid from eye of hook over bead chain eyes and tie securely wrapping thread and tying off ahead of bead chain.
- 8. Whip finish and apply head cement to thread and a coating of clear nail polish to metallic braid to ensure that the fly will withstand at least 21 trout and a few ladyfish attacks.
- 9. Field test with intermediate or sink-tip line along edge of flats or under lighted docks.

#### Proud as peacock herl

In my fly tying classes he was one of the most enthusiastic learners I taught. ### Capt. Ray Markham: Lake Okeechobee, still the place to go

Recently, I participated in the First Annual Glades County TDC Sportswriter's Invitational. There were approximately 14 outdoor writer's participating in the event to showcase the area's fishing opportunities.

On my first morning fishing my guide, retired county sheriff and local angler, Stuart Whiddon and I put about 40 bass in the boat using an assortment of lures. That afternoon, I fished with Sam Heaton, a legend in the fishing industry and a member of the Freshwater Fishing Hall of Fame. Again we scored some nice bass on lures. The day was a real treat for me, fishing the Big O, a lake I'd always wanted to fish, and it didn't disappoint.



For my fly fishing friends, I managed to break out a 5 wt. fly rod the second day while fishing

with Clyde Johnson, a local tournament angler who's very savvy when it comes to the lake and where some big bass hide. Again, we scored some nice fish, and although I wasn't the one who caught the monsters, some folks in our group managed big bass up to 8 pounds 10 ounces! But best of all, I caught bass using some foam spider imitations tied by our very own Layne "Smitty" Smith. The fish inhaled those flies! Attached is one of the bass caught on fly.

There is plenty of cover on the lake in the form of lily pads, a variety of structure, and loads of grass. A full floating line and some poppers, sliders, or worm imitations are all you need to score some nice bass or bluegill. In the spring, you can target some big crappie. Bass will be on the beds then too.

Our time on the water was cut short due to incoming storms, but if you want to spend some time on the water with some great guides and on perhaps the lake known for its legendary big bass, Lake Okeechobee is the place to go. 



### Dennis Marquis: Fly fishing from a RecVee





#### to south:

- Fort Island boat ramp, take W Fort Island Trail off of 98
- Ozello boat ramp, take W Ozello Trail off of 98
- Homosassa boat launch, 6891 S Mason Creek Rd, 34448, also off of 98

Cindy and I did fish with Capt. Jim Farrior, who took us out of the Homosassa launch. He poled all day, we saw many redfish and, unfortunately, they saw us first. Winds were again out of the west, so we had to pole into the sun, which made it hard to sight fish. I did have several strong hits, all on a spoon fly (which I believe would be the ticket up there), but did not land a single fish. I enjoyed Jim, the Homosassa area and I could tell that on a better day we would be successful. I plan to hook up with Jim again when we get back in the area after November. I try to learn from every experience, with Jim's help, I was introduced to the spoon fly and I am now tying these. ### Bob Morrison: Summer Fishing Tips



#### Summer's here. You know the drill.

**Summer's here. Afternoons are iffy** -- It's been awhile since we have seen normal summer weather, but things have stabilized somewhat and we should be getting sunshine and light winds in the mornings and some showers later on in the afternoons

Baitfish schools are close to shore -- Calm conditions have cleaned up inshore waters somewhat and bait schools have moved in close to shore where you can reach them.

**Tarpon moving fast in the bay** -- Look for tarpon in the morning in smaller schools moving faster than normal over shallow, grass beds.

Fly patterns? Here ya go -- Tarpon are taking pinfish, crabs and threadfins so choose your fly patterns accordingly

Find the mullet; find the redfish -- Redfish have been following mullet, mixing with them over the same grass beds and feeding aggressively. Choose patterns accordingly - pinfish, crabs and theadfins.

Go get 'em and good luck,

# Capt. Pat Damico: Fly Casting Clinic. Tip #100. My last one

I have a few wading spots that I avoid because of slippery wading conditions and balance but my catch ratio has never been better. Having the rod do the work saves my joints and allows me to cast with ease. Instead of covering more water I have become a better observer and plan my strategy to catch more difficult fish. The fly fishing fraternity has been a great help to me and my friendships continue to make fly fishing a wonderful sport.

### Early risers will be rewarded

This time of year is perfect for early risers who love to fly fish. Pods of snook are within a few feet of the sand in the trough along most beaches. Though the season is closed, catch-and-release opportunities have never been better. A large female with a group of smaller males will do their courting in these locations, especially if there is good current flow. Locations with structure close to passes are the best. A good pair of Polaroid glasses is a necessity. Stay on the bank and out of the water. The rising sun behind you will reveal fish. You will see baitfish. Duplicate their size with white flies. Crimp all hooks, making easy penetration possible with a quick release as the fish is still in the water. Hold your cast until the fish is facing you. Then cast to the side of the fish. The fly, with a 30-pound shock tippet, is then retrieved, duplicating an escaping baitfish. It should trigger a violent strike. An eight-weight, fast-action 9-foot rod is perfect and will allow you to quickly pick up a long cast if misplaced or refused. Make a second cast immediately. Change fly patterns after several refusals of good presentations. If there is strong wave action, a clear, sinking tip line might work better than a floating one for better line management.

#### Eggs are good for you

What does BOFFFF stands for? - Fat female fish lay more eggs than the smaller ones. Exponentially more. Disproportionally more. Fecondly more. For example, the biggest vermilion snapper doesn't weight 400 times more than a little vermillion snapper but it does produce 400 times more eggs than the smallest. There's an acronym for that fish: BOFFFF. Big Old Fat Fecund Female Fish. The takeaway? When you catch a big, egg-laying female, of any species, be nice to her. Release her to continue to do what she does best. (Washington Post)

**Hey, let's have an outing on this lake --** Lake Istokpoga is about a two-hour drive from St. Pete. That's probably too long a drive for one of our monthly outings. Still, take a look at the pictures of these two huge bass. The good news? Both are still swimming in this beautiful lake near Sebring, Florida. Yeah, FWC's Trophy Catch program does it again. (The Fishing Wire)

A better loop knot? - Most fly fishers know how to tie the Perfection Loop Knot for building a leader. Here is the same knot used for connecting the bite tippet to the fly. If it works on a bait hook (seen in the video) then it'll work on a fly. My fingers are so used to tying the Vic Dunaway Uniknot I will have to retrain them to tie this knot. It looks easier and quicker, and it's smaller, too. (Salt Strong)


























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
