Ken Hofmeister, Suncoast Fly Fisher, Rest in Peace



Suncoast Fly Fisher Ken Hofmeister died May 4

Ken Hofmeister died May 4 after an eight-year battle with multiple myeloma cancer.

Ken was a former president, board member, and enthusiastic participant in many outings and outreach endeavors of the Suncoast Fly Fishers. Most recently he served as secretary of the Florida Council of Fly Fishers International.

Ken's wife Ann asked President George Haseltine to let members know that Ken valued the "joy, fun, and fellowship" that the Suncoast Fly Fishers provided. She said, "This group has been so important to Ken and he loves you all deeply."

A memorial service was held Saturday, May 12 at Lutheran Church of the Cross in Shore Acres. Following the service family and friends, including many Suncoast Fly Fishers, gathered in the adjacent fellowship hall to express their sadness and support to his grieving family.

Cancer took his life but his good friend Al Pitcher, who was with Ken frequently in recent weeks, said that Ken remained his upbeat, happy self until the end.

Al even arranged for a fishing excursion a week before he died. Ken, in his wheelchair, got to cast to fish in Tampa Bay on a beautiful, calm-water morning.

Al said, "Ken's spirit will live on through the many lives he has impacted both in the fly fishing community and elsewhere. Through Ken I came to know the true meaning of friendship. I will sincerely miss his attitude of positivity, his love for all things fishing, and most of all the man."



SFF President Letter – May 2018

We were sitting in his Gheenoe on a canal in the Everglades. The day was beautiful, no wind to speak of, no bugs and no intense heat. Perfect.

We had already caught many brim, Oscars, Mayan cichlids and bass. I wanted to change it up a bit, so I dug out this small brown Clouser with copper flash. I really

didn't think much of it. I don't even know where I got it. Our members are so generous, anybody could have given it to me.

For some mysterious reason, you have to believe in the fly you're using or it just won't work. Alan looked closely and said "That's the way I would have tied it." Immediately I felt better about it and cast it toward the shore.

Bam!!, a Bass hit it with a vengeance! He jumped a foot into the air, hit the water and headed for Cuba. I was using a two-weight rod (that Alan had built for me) with a 6# leader. What a hoot! It was great! I finally got him to the boat so we could look at him. It was a **peacock bass**!

Excited and therefore forgetting that I had only a 6# leader, I lifted him up enough to remove the hook, he gave one last surge of power and he was gone, fly and all. No picture, no proof except that we both saw it. He was only about 14" long, but really beautiful.

We decided at our Board Meeting on April 5th that we would make our Everglades trip an official club outing. At our meeting on May 3rd, we decided to name it the **Don Manning Everglades Outing** in honor of the man who finally convinced us that we should go there; and that he was not exaggerating when he claimed to catch hundreds of fish. Does anyone know how to contact Don's family to let them know?

If you missed the trip this year, start making plans to join us next year. It is a great experience. Ask all the questions you want. Let us help remove all doubts and fears.

Alan Sewell has volunteered to reserve rooms and plan the fish fry well in advance. He did a great job at the fish fry this year. Thanks Alan.

And, I always learn something new about our members. Did you know Kevin Goettel was a fireman in New York City? Way to go Kevin!

We have a lot planned for the remainder of the year. 

Captain Ray Markham: How to fish Fort DeSoto Park on outing day

Water movement, wind direction, and wind velocity are paramount when considering where to fish May 19th. Fish white Clousers or glass minnow patterns on the rising tide west of the maintenance shack after 10 am for snook. The small bridge there funnels current on both sides of the bridge, creating ambush points for trout, snook, and flounder. Tides are slow to come in until about 10 a.m. unless there is a south wind. Fishing west beach and inside Bunces Pass by Arrowhead will produce snook, trout, ladyfish, Spanish mackerel, redfish, and bluefish. This could be your best starting spot.

Suncoast Fly Fisher <mark>Capt. Ray Markham</mark> specializes in inshore game fishing. He writes the West Central Action Spotter page each month in Florida Sportsman magazine.

We'll have a slow incoming tide with a nice solunar slot between 6:30 and 8:30 am. (Tides4Fishing)

I used my dependable white spider and nothing else and caught multiple bass in the 12 to 15 inch range but my target fish was the exotics and the truly cooperated. Estimate that I had probably 300 hook ups each day. Brought home 150 filets.

Walt Durkin –Hot spots and tips for wade-fishing Tampa Bay


Our April meeting speaker was Walt Durkin, president of the Tampa Bay Fly Fishers, who shared some powerful tips on the best flats to fish in Tampa Bay, and how to fish them. Thank you, Walt!

Here's a generous summary of his talk provided by Walt:

Winter Sight Fishing Tips

To optimize sight fishing in the winter focus on those mornings with the lowest tides. Look online for tide charts for November through February. Those days around the full and new moons will have the lowest tides. Mark those days with a minus .5 or lower, but the lower the better.

Next, watch for N, NE, or E winds after a front comes thru. Those winds will push the tide even lower. Seek those

golden days with a good negative low and a helping wind. You will find the

fish cruising on the edge of the flat in deeper water.

As the tide comes in and the fish follow, you will be well-positioned. Fish small crab or shrimp patterns on long leaders (12 feet) down to 10-pound test. Cast 3 to 5 feet in front of moving fish and get your fly on the bottom before the fish sees it. As the fish approaches, bump the fly a little until the fish see it and eats it. If the fish follows the fly, keep it moving until he eats. If he turns away, pick up and try again, you may get lucky.

Cast close to tailing fish when their tails are up. Failing that, try to cast a few feet in front of them. Remember, tailing fish are happy and feeding.

Always look for and try to fish around mullet. Mullet provide security and food for the game fish you seek. Be watchful on the flat and move slowly. You will be most observant when standing still. I fish Cypress Park and MacDill a lot, but encourage you to find a flat

and make it your own.

Each winter you will find about 15 days when the tide and weather come together for perfect conditions. Make the

most of them for a super sight fishing adventures.

Finally, keep a journal to record and remember your outing.

Walt

Tying Bench - Layne Smith, Jointed Pencil Popper



Fish this fly as if it were a wounded baitfish. Give it a couple of SHORT, hard strips to make it POP, POP then let it sit. Because it is jointed it will act like a crippled baitfish.

NOTE: This fly can be tied as a tube fly as well. Just use your favorite tubing material and saltwater hook.

Materials:

Hook: Daiichi saltwater 2546 #2 Thread: Danville Flatwaxed Nylon White Tail: Krystal Flash Pearl Rear body: Frizzle Chenille (Hairline Dubbing) UV Pearl (large %") Articulated Shank: fish Skull Shank 1¾" (35 mm) Front body: Soft Body Perfect Popper Eyes: ¼" molded eyes silver w/ black pupil Coating: Loon Hardhead Pearlescent Green or Solarez UV Resin * Cement: Fletch-Tite Platinum, CA Cement or SHHAN Misc: Scotch or Blue painters tape, Red Sharpie, pearl glitter (optional)

Tying Sequence:

1. Place hook in vise and lay down a base wrap from hook eye to just above the hook barb. Take 6 strands of Krystal Flash and fold in half and cut, repeat and then wrap the flash around thread at halfway point of flash and tie on hook shank just above the barb for the tail. Trim to hook shank length if needed.

2. Attach Frizzle Chenille in front of tail and palmer forward to hook eye, stroking material backwards after each wrap as you go. Whip finish, coat and cure with UV Resin.

3. Use curved scissors to taper rear body all around to tail.

4. Attach articulated shank down through hook eye. Remove hook from vise and then insert the back loop of the articulated shank in vise. (Note: Use a twist-tie to tie hook bend to vise shaft to keep it from flopping around as you finish the rest of the fly.)

5. Attach thread to rear of articulated shank and use several wraps to close gap of the shank and then continue to lay down a good base wrap to within an eyes width of the shank eye using "touching wraps" as you go. Whip finish and trim thread. Apply a drop of head cement to thread wraps at both the front and rear of shank.

6. Coat base wrap with CA cement and then open the slit in popper body and slide onto shank making sure to cover thread at rear of shank with the popper body. Rotate the vise 180 degrees to expose the slit in body. Fill gap with CA cement, pinch closed and hold until cement sets.

Tying Bench – Walt Durkin's Rat Fly



I started fishing this small crab/shrimp fly in December 2017. On four trips the first week I caught 13 fish: 4 reds, 4 trout, 4 snook and 1 sheepshead. I really tied it with sheepshead in mind and that was the first fish I caught as it tailed first thing in the morning, Tie the fly in tan or brown to fish over sand and black or green to fish over grass. You can also use Puglisi tarantula brush for the body. However, the Crystal flash works fine and is a little brighter. This simple fly

is a winner as it hops along the bottom with lively legs. Great for sight fishing in the winter for all game fish. You can also strip it slowly in deeper water to imitate a shrimp.

Materials and tying sequence

Hook: Gamakatsu B10S Stinger, size 6 or Mustad Tarpon 2XH/2XS, size 4. Use bead chain eyes on the stinger hook for a light fly and small lead eyes on the Mustad hook for a little heavier fly.

I have been tying mostly with clear mono thread. On the light hook, tie in the bead chain and add 3/8 inch lead wire behind and over the eyes to form a keel.

Tie in a bit of orange rabbit for a small hot spot to represent an egg sack at the bend.

Next, cut two small pieces of thin zonker strips and tie one on each side of the hot spot in the back; angle them up a little.

Use crystal flash to complete the body. I also add one strand of hard Mason (20 lb) for a weed guard.

6. Coat base wrap with CA cement and then open the slit in popper body and slide onto shank making sure to cover thread at rear of shank with the popper body. Rotate the vise 180 degrees to expose the slit in body. Fill gap with CA cement, pinch closed and hold until cement sets.

7. Use "blue painters tape" or Scotch tape to create a template for coloring the head of the fly. Start the tape at the slit on the bottom of the popper body and tilt the angle of the tape to mimic the angle of the fly face until you get to the top then angle it back to match the other side going down the other side. Cut off remaining tape leaving a tab for easy removal after coloring head. Color head and/or face with red Sharpie. Remove tape.

8. Attach eyes with Fletch-Tite making sure to even them out vertically and horizontally.**9.** Starting from the rear of the popper, apply coating (Loon Hardhead or UV Resin) with smooth strokes to coat body being careful to not allow the Sharpie colored portion to run. ********NOTE: This step can be made a little easier by realigning popper body in vise to hang vertically as you apply the coating. Let dry in rotating dryer or, if using

resin, cure with a UV light.



Bob Morrison: How-To Tips and More



Flounder, seatrout still feeding -- The cooler weather has slowed the snook bite, but there has been no slowing of the flounder and seatrout feeding. Trout have been thriving in this cooler spring weather so fish hard for them while they're feeding continues.

Snook active in deep water -- Snook are feeding less strongly but are active in deeper water and near obstructions. Try the Lefty Kreh-type flies with feathered tails. Also try poppers and gurglers which are also producing.

Cold front coming? -- Freezing temperatures in the middle west may reach Florida and push fish into deeper water. Expect cold weather here by April 15 but we really can't predict fish feeding very well until the weather arrives and effects fish activity one way or another.

Introducing kids to sportfishing -- Several people have suggested that we start helping children learn to fish by first-timing them with worms and bobbers, "graduating them to spinning and fly fishing as they grow older. I believe this approach will bring more kids into the sport and thereby increase or at least maintain our membership numbers.

We aren't just fishermen you know -- During times like these we must keep a close eye on our children. They are our most valuable asset and, remember, we must teach them since we are not just fishermen. We are conservationists. We are the experts from which they must learn and they must learn the value systems which we want to them to hold and pursue. After all, children are the future and wildlife, including fish, will be needing them in the future.

Sea turtle nesting season — we must keep our beaches dark during sea turtle nesting season which will extend from now through October. Beachgoers should avoid using cell phones at night so as not to confuse the hatchlings as to which direction they should go to reach the sea.

Oyster shells are sharp -- Watch for new oyster beds that are being planted in Tampa Bay. These beds filter the water and make it cleaner for all creatures, including fish.

Casting Injuries.... Cast with your body

Continuing suggestions to prevent casting injuries...

Lefty showed this to Brad Lowman and I while attending one of the TFO booths in Tampa years ago. He took us over to the casting pond and had me cast using my body. Standing with the foot on my casting side, or right side, a little behind my left foot I placed my elbow against my side and holding the rod off at a slight angle made a series of forward and back casts shifting my weight from my front foot to my rear foot. My body moved with the weight shift as did the rod. This can be on a boat and will not cause movement. Following the 5 Essentials we discussed previously, I was able to cast effortlessly. Make sure you do not swivel at the hips as the rod tip will travel in a large arc creating a large loop. This is especially suitable with heavier rods and casters of smaller stature.

Be respectful of shallow-water fly fishers

Warmer weather and improved inshore fishing conditions will have more people on the water, especially on weekends. This can adversely affect shallow-water fly fishers. Trout, snook and redfish present more challenges where they can be sight-fished. There is nothing more rewarding than having a sighted fish in shallow water take a well-presented fly or small artificial bait after a careful stalk. In order for this to happen, the fish has to be happy or free of stress. To be successful, the fish's resistance to seek plentiful food in clear shallow water must be overcome. Predators, both winged and swimming, are constant issues, but careless fishermen and boaters become an increasing problem because of our large population that is also attracted to the water. If you see a shallow watercraft or waders fishing in skinny water, keep your distance. They often have spent considerable time and effort getting to this spot, and a visitor on jet skis or other watercraft will disrupt their efforts. Practice the golden rule, especially in the shallows.




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
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
