

March 22, 2008 Outing - Lake Manatee February Outing

Armed with aerial view maps, we hit Ft. DeSoto Park early on Saturday morning, confident that we knew where the fish were. Unfortunately, the fish didn't read the map. Some of the "honey holes" were empty. Unlike real estate, in fishing, location is only part of the equation. About half of us caught fish. Ron Kelly caught a 22½ inch redfish and his partner, Robert Fisher, went on to catch an identical 22½ inch redfish. They claim it wasn't the same fish. Since he pulled in the first fish, Ron gets the prize. No snook were caught, but the usual collection of trout and ladyfish were taken. Mark Hays treated us to venison burgers for lunch. We had a good time and managed to finish lunch before a heavy rain storm hit the park.

March 22, 2008 Outing:

The March outing will be at Lake Manatee, east of Bradenton. This 1,800 acre lake was formed by a dam across the Manatee River and it clams to hold large mouth bass, sunshine bass and the usual collection of panfish. There is an excellent boat ramp in the Lake Manatee State Park, with good access to the lake. A smaller, more rustic ramp is lo-

cated 3 miles up river from the State Park, and it provides access to the upper end of the lake as well as to the Manatee River. There is \$4.00 per vehicle entrance fee at



the State Park, and boat motors are restricted to 20 horsepower or less. A map, showing prime fishing spots on the lake and river, will be available at the meeting. To get there, drive South on I 75 to Bradenton. At Exit 220, drive East on State Road 64. The park entrance is on the left side of State Road 64 about 9 miles east of I 75. Lunch will be served at the picnic area in the State Park at Noon.

Norm Sande: Schminnow, Wooly Bugger Enver Hysni: Keys Tarpon Fly, Shrimp Fly




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Fishing The Chassahowitzka River by Capt. Pat Damico

I really enjoy getting away from the crowds and exploring new territory. My fellow Tampa Bay Fly Fishing Club fishing buddy Nick Angelo and I were going to meet the next day to fish a local river that empties into Tampa Bay. Nick's phone call to finalize plans began with, "Pat, have you ever fished the Chassahowitzka?" Nick, "I can't even pronounce it," was my response. His enthusiastic assurance that I would like it was all I needed to say yes.

We arranged to meet on the north end of Tampa where we would ride together in his vehicle towing his skinny running Hell's Bay flats skiff.

The predawn traffic thinned out, as we made our way north into the country leaving suburbia in the rear view mirror. As the sun began to rise, we arrived at the Chassahowitzka River campground boat launch, paid a fee, and slid the boat into the clearest, most pristine looking water I have seen in Florida. I felt like I was transplanted into bygone era as we idled down river toward the bay. Freshwater bass and bluegills scooted around the boat as we enjoyed the sounds of an awaking wilderness. Beautiful cypress trees, cabbage palms, saw grass, sweet gum trees and colorful red maples provided a canopy that widened as we continued our journey. A mature osprey flew ahead of the boat as a guide seeming to take us to his favorite fishing hole. Great blue herons, cormorants and anhingas loudly voiced their objections to our presence as we disturbed their awakening and stretching routine. The widening river revealed some fish camps and houses that must have been there forever. Nick grinned as he asked, "What do you think?" I was too busy digging



for my camera to get some pictures of this pristine wilderness to give a very long answer other than, Beautiful!"

The tide was just beginning to slowly come in and the clear, very shallow water made me glad that we were not using my larger Maverick boat. Nick's previous trips there were enough to keep us safe for the rest of the day. This is not a place for anything but the shallowest running watercraft. Approaching the salt clusters of oysters, underwater obstacles, hard bottom, grass, thinly exposed flats, and patches of muddy water

made navigation a nightmare. Many grass covered islands were visible as the bay unfolded before us. An overcast day with occasional short interruptions of sunshine did not improve visibility. When running the outboard, we mostly idled with the motor tilted. A bow mounted electric was also put into service several times. Poling is always the most effective means of making a stealthy shallow approach, so we took turns working some familiar areas where he had successfully fished on other trips.

We always check the weather before leaving, paying particular attention to the wind. Very little protection is afforded here, so a calm day would be ideal. I fished with a seven weight and Nick a nine weight, using weight forward floating lines and nine foot leaders with a twenty pound tippet. Our target species was redfish. On Nick's last trip, a number of large jacks interrupted their redfish search. I kept a nine weight with a popper handy in case we had the same thing happen. We both love large jacks on the surface.

Fishing was slow until the tide began to go out at a very fast flow rate. A large school of mullet was spread over one side of a nearby island, so we headed there. I was on the pole and Nick, an excellent caster, began to ply the mullet with one of Leigh West's green

and gold Clouser style patterns. A redfish was hooked on the second cast. After releasing it, a few additional casts were rewarded with another hookup. An anchor was quietly slid over the side to hold our position. Keeping a small plastic covered mushroom anchor in the boat with about ten feet of line on it to immediately deploy off the stern when school type fish are discovered is a great idea. Now I could also fish! My tippet sported a small gold and copper colored Mylar Kwan style crab pattern. Since we had located the fish, this choice proved to be a good one. A very slow retrieve on the bottom was needed for success. We worked the mullet school, occasionally lifting the anchor and poling another twenty feet or so to work a different section of water. When we left this location, we had ten reds that we released, as well as a few that managed to get off or avoid our strip sets. These fish were all very silver in color attesting to the excellent water quality. We caught several other fish later as we worked our way back toward the channel markers leading to the launch. A stop at one of the many fresh water springs had bluegills and large mouth bass chasing and hitting our smaller offerings. Where else could you combine such a variety of shallow water fishing with a breathtaking view?

We had spent almost an entire day there and had only touched a small part of what the Chassahowitzka National Wildlife Refuge has to offer. Federal, state and local agencies jointly manage over 35,000 acres which include many islands, estuaries, salt marshes, and coastal swamps. A Google search will give you a wealth of information for you to review in preparation for a very enjoyable day on the water. When the monotonous routine of urban fishing starts to gnaw at your interest level, head to the Chassahowitzka to cleanse your soul!

Fly Fish Argentina, March 14-22 and 23-31, 2009 by Capt Pat Damico

After showing pictures from my dream trip to Patagonia, Argentina, several members asked me if I was hosting a trip. I have been in contact with Esquel Outfitters, www.esqueloutfitters.com, our excellent guide service, and the above weeks were selected for two trips. 2008 is almost full. The first is an exact duplicate of mine. Float fish the Rivadavia the first day, float/camp Rio Chubut the next four days, three nights luxury camping, sixty miles of river will be covered. Day seven, fish Rio Gualjaina, twenty miles of private water on a 80,000 acre ranch. Day eight, fish the most famous spring creek in Argentina....Arroyo Pescado, filled with large rainbows and browns.

Second week, float fish Rivadavia, in Los Alerces National Park, day three, float fish the Rio Carrileufu, eleven miles; fourth day, float fish Rio Arrayanes and Lago Verde. Day five fish the private twenty mile long Rio Gualjaina, walk and wade; day six private spring creek Arroyo Pescado, and the last day Rio Gualjainia. Overnight flights to Buenos Aires and a short morning flight to Bariloche where guides will pick you up and return you at the end of your stay. 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Fly Tying Bench — McVay's Gotcha by Paul Sequira

Several years ago I was preparing for a week in the Keys and looking forward to fishing for bonefish and permit on the flats in the Grassy Key area. Lefty Kreh was visiting John Homer's Salt Water Fly Fisherman shop in Clearwater and I had the opportunity to talk with Lefty about my upcoming trip. When asked what his favorite flies would be for the fishing I was planning, he recommended four flies: McVay's Gotcha, Brown Snapping Shrimp, Tan Clouser and Chartreuse Clouser. Those flies worked well in the Keys and I discovered that along with the others, the McVay Gotcha also worked very well for redfish right here in Tampa Bay.



Materials:

- **Hook:** Mustad 34007 size 2, 4
- Thread: Flourescent or Gotcha Pink Danville Flat Waxed Nylon
- Eyes: silver bead chain 1/8" on size 4 or 5/32" on size 2 or 1/50th oz. lead barbells for fast sink
- Tail: Pearl mylar tubing combed out
- Body: Pearl diamond braid
- Wing: Yellow Krystal Flash over blond craft fur Note: The proper color is Mystic Bay Flies' "Light Gold" or Heritage Textiles "Blonde". When fishing dark bottoms, a red tinted orange wing can be used and when fishing mangrove shore lines an red tinted brown wing is useful.

Tying Instructions

- 1. Pinch the barb down and secure the hook in the vise in the normal fashion.
- 2. Attach the thread to the hook shank near the eye but leaving enough room to create an oversized pink nose. Make a small bump of thread and attach the eyes with a figure eight wrap. Bind all the wraps tight and apply a drop of head cement or super glue to lock in.
- 3. Attach a flattened piece of pearlescent mylar tubing onto the top of the hook shank behind the eyes, wrapping the thread all the way to the hook bend. Cut the excess off leaving a tail the same length as the hook shank. Brush out the frayed ends of the mylar. Wrap the thread back up to the bead chain.
- 4. Tie in the pearlescent diamond braid on top of the mylar tubing, binding it down to the shank with close wraps all the way to the hook bend, then wrap the thread back to the bead chain eyes again with close wraps to create a pink underbody so that it will show through after the body is wrapped. Wind the diamond braid forward to the bead chain eyes to complete the body.
- 5. Turn the hook over so that the point is now up. Select a medium sized bunch of craft fur and tie in the wing directly in front of the bead chain eyes. The wing should extend to the end of the tail. Select six strands of yellow Krystal Flash and tie in at the mid point folding the flash over to double them and secure with several wraps of thread. Cut off excess to match the length of the wing.
- 6. Form a longer than normal nose with the pink thread. Coat with several applications of head cement.


