Habitat? Well, yeah!

Bonefish & Tarpon Trust (BTT) is working with the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) to make fishing better for sport fishers. The proposed fisheries management plan adds habitat to the tools FWC can use to keep fish populations healthy. Believe it or not, to manage fishs populations FWC is limited to using only seasonal shutdowns, slot sizes, and bag limits. But if we want FWC to be able to use habitat, B&TT needs us to step up and help the cause and there are a few ways that we can help: Go here to learn more.

Did somebody say "habitat?"

Tampa Bay Watch is recruiting volunteers to install oyster shell bars and create oyster domes with a goal to restore lost habitat systems to the bay, prevent further erosion of shorelines, and improve water quality through natural biological filtration. Oyster shell projects involve shoveling fossilized shell into mesh bags, transporting the bags to the project site and placing oyster shell bags on the shoreline to create a series of oyster bars. We have two sites this fall: McKay Bay and MacDill Air Force Base. McKay Bay: Oct. 25, Nov. 7, Nov. 8. MacDill AFB: Nov. 14-16, Dec. 5-6. Go to the TBW website for all the info.

Durkin and friends fly-fish Columbia, Cayman, Belize, Alaska

Wade-fisher extraordinaire Walt Durkin entertained SFF members with exploits from his latest fly-fishing trips at the September 19 SFF Club Meeting. Walt, President of Tampa Bay Fly Fishers, travels regularly with friends in search of great fly fishing. Most trips turn out well.

Destination trip 1: Tucanare Lodge - Columbia. Target species: Peacock Bass

Located on the Vichada River in Cumaribo, Cichada,

Columbia, the Tuncanare Fishing Camp is well-known for trophy Peacock Bass fishing. After an auspicious start . . . things went south. The first night

Not every trip is a success, but some were . . .

Destination trip 2: Grand Cayman Island, British West Indies. Target species: Bonefish

Located in the Caribbean south of Cuba, Grand Cayman is popular with tourists looking for a nice beach vacation. It also offers some nice bone fishing opportunities. The best spots for bonefish on Grand Cayman

include the West Bay Mosquito Ditches and Frank's Sound. Walt and his party hired a guide for a ½-day @ \$400 who took them to 4-5 good spots for bonefish in Frank's Sound. This area is protected from the wind.

Besides wade-fishing, the group fished from kayaks and had a number of shots at spooky bonefish. While few bone fish were taken during their week, the group did have an interesting encounter with one bonefish which kept coming back for more. This particular fish wasn't spooky like the others. And Walt caught him only to discover the fish had one eye and a hole completely through its gill

plate. The next day Walt's wife Patty spotted a bonefish lurking in the local pond and worked for 45-minutes

to catch it. It turned out to be the one-eyed fish again. The following day Walt's buddy Ted also caught "One-Eyed Jack."

Following some nice sight-seeing the group all agreed that Grand Cayman is a great place for a fun vacation and to do some fishing on the side. Walt's party of six staved at hotel at Rum Point @ \$3,000 for one week for three couples. However, serious anglers will want to consider a boat trip to nearby Little Cayman Island where the local waters are loaded with bonefish and baby tarpon that receive little fishing pressure.

Destination trip 3: Ambergris Caye, Belize. Target species: Bonefish, Permit, Tarpon

The largest island in Belize, Ambergris Cay borders Mexico. San Pedro is the only town on the island.

Local waters feature some of the largest flats in the world for bonefish, permit and tarpon.

The area experiences a lot of fishing pressure. Bonefish run on the smaller size and can be spooky. Even so, Walt was able to catch three bonefish. He also caught a nice Permit. Crab and shrimp flies are most productive.

A trip to San Pedro requires air travel to Belize City and a commuter flight to Ambergris Caye. Walt's party stayed at the Blue Bonefish Lodge. Cost is \$2,500 for a

week per person and includes a guide. While traveling through Belize City consider taking a side trip to visit the local Mayan ruins.

Destination trip 4: Brooks Falls, Katmai National Park in Southwest Alaska.

Target species: Rainbow Trout and Sockeye Salmon

Offering world-class fishing for rainbow trout and sockeye salmon, Katmai National Park should be on the bucket-list of any angler according to Walt. Visitors to Katmai will encounter fishing with a twist - they share

the water with Alaskan Grizzly Bears in search of Sockeye Salmon. For this reason all visitors are required to take a bear-encounter course to ensure their safety.

Walt and his party stayed at the Nack River Camp. Cost is \$3,500 per person/week which includes fully guided trips. Anglers fish egg patterns for rainbow trout.

Smitty's Fly Box : Squirrel Tail Minnow

The Squirrel Tail Minnow has proven to be an effective fly to catch freshwater and saltwater gamefish in the Tampa Bay area. Suncoast Fly Fisher Mark Hays

won the Carl Hanson trophy a few years back fishing a fly like this. Mark says ... "Fish it like a minnow. ... That easy." This fly can be tied straight (with tail, body and throat) or in a bend-back style with only wing and throat. Hook styles and sizes vary, of course. See photos at right.

Another Bendback Style

Materials:

Hook: Any long-shanked freshwater hook size 8-10 (bluegill) 2-6 (bass)

Thread: Danville Flat waxed Nylon; color to match

Weight: .15 lead wire or gold bead

Tail: (optional) Red or yellow floss combed out

Body: (optional) Holographic tinsel

Wing: Prepared squirrel tail. Because squirrel tail is such a slick hair, you need to size it to hook length size as well as how large you want your wing. Once you have sized it, trim butt ends and add a bit of SHHAN to hold it together. Set aside and allow to dry before tying fly. As a matter of fact, you can tie up to half a dozen or more to this step and set aside.

Throat: (optional) light-colored underfur (your choice)

Finish: Solarez UV Resin or SHHAN

Tying Sequence:

- 1. Place hook in vise just and add wraps of lead behind eye. Tie down lead
- 2. Coat thread-wrapped lead to keep in place.

Want to add a tail? See the note below.

- 3. Attach prepared squirrel tail over-top of lead wraps in smooth wraps allowing it to wrap slightly around the hook shank on both sides.
- 4. Coat thread wraps liberally with UV Resin and cure.

You can add a tail, too.

If you choose you can add a tail (that should be done after step two by just running the thread to the bend of the hook in open wraps then tie in the tail followed by wrapping tinsel body by running the thread forward in open wraps to eye of hook; tie in tinsel and wrap it in overlapping wraps to tail then back to the eye. Tie off and remove excess tinsel. Coat body with UV Resin and cure) Then proceed to step 3. If you want to add optional throat, this would be done after step 3.

Dennis Marquis: Tierra Verde Fishing Report

I continue to fish the same spot I wrote about last month (N $27^{\circ}41.102'$, W $82^{\circ}38.736'$). It continues to produce and I enjoy the bend it supplies to my fly rod. I take nice size mackerel and trout consistently from this spot. I learned that I need at least a 25-30 lb. tippet and even still I lose some flies to the mackerel.

From my home in Tierra Verde, I travel east under the Tierra Verde bridge toward the Dick Meisner bridge. Passing under the Dick Meisner bridge, I take the channel to the fourth set of channel markers and turn hard right toward the communication tower. As I approach the communication tower, I turn hard right again now facing due west. I slow the boat to a crawl, and when the water depth changes to about 4-5 feet I stop the boat and start fishing. When I find fish, I set my Power Pole anchor. This puts you just east of the flats by about 10-20 yards.

I'll admit to chucking a 17MR18 MirrOdine on a spinning rod to see if anyone is home. This typically results in a strike. Once confirmed, I stow the spin rod and cast my favorite 8-wt. The fly of choice for me continues to be any "well" weighted one, such as a Clouser, half n half, or a heavy bead chain pattern. I've had my best days using brighter orange/white, chartreuse/white and pink/chartreuse. Bruce Evensen's holiday fly has also worked! I like the profile of the "holiday fly" so I have tied it in a variety of colors.

Sunday, 9/29 was a one of the more memorable days. I met a neighbor (Joe) who flies fishes, but not often. He was a member of the Tampa club, but for whatever reason is no longer. He had not cast a fly in over a year. We hit the spot by 7 am to fish the last of the outgoing tide. Did the routine, cast the Mirrodine, got a strike, stowed the spin rod and started to cast our Clousers. I initially used an olive/white and Joe chartreuse/white. He hooked up immediately with a mackerel and landed several more fish (mackerel and trout), when he got close to his first dozen, I figured it was time for me to tie on a chartreus/white Clouser and get into the game. I set the power pole and we stayed in this spot for 2 hours, only backing up into slightly deeper water every 30 minutes or so as the water level dropped with the outgoing tide. The sweet spot seemed to be an edge in about 4ft of water casting toward the distant Skyway Bridge. Trout were 12-15" in the early part of the morning, then there was a change and we started to land nice healthy looking slot size trout. We took home a half dozen mackerel and one keeper size mangrove snapper for Sunday dinner. Joe left the boat a satisfied fisher!

I also took Bill AuCoin and Rick Warfel to this same spot on separate days. Both landed mackerel and trout as expected. Rick seemed to have a knack for letting his go before we could get a pic of his trophies. Bill on the other hand, after landing a few and feeling good about the day, decided to tie on a "pink" gurgler (which I did not think would work in these conditions) and he proved me wrong. A nice trout came up; whacked the gurgler twice before hooking on. I did get a pic of Bill smiling over this one.

I also hit the spot with Woody, however it was very windy out of the

NE. We tried to cast the fly but it was

not happening, so we opted to use the spin rod. We landed a lot of fish with

hard baits in all three water depths. We were pleased to see many healthy slot size trout. We also lost a lot of lures to large toothy fish – expensive day! Woody took a couple of mackerel home to try out my recipe.

Dennis' Mackerel Recipe

Try this easy recipe for nice grilled fish.

First, land your mackerel (ha ha), then bleed it and put it on ice.

Back at the dock remove head and tail, then slit it down the ventral side (bottom) and carefully filet out the middle bone leaving you with a whole fish skin on. Remove the belly meat.

Using a large mixing bowl add an ample amount of olive oil and Italian seasoning.

Coat each fish inside and out.

Slice a whole lemon thinly and stuff as many pieces in as the fish will hold.

Heat your grill and cook on each side 8-10 minutes. That's it, delicious and easy.

Ponds make snook go to the darkside

Howdy! This month I thought I would share my newbie thoughts on PONDS! Tiny, little ponds full of great fishing, gators, and what???? Brackish water???

I had heard about poons, snooks, and reds in small ponds fed by estuaries and canals. So; after lots of scouting and trial and error I have found a few that produce. (Alas; no tarpon yet.).

Why fish a pond? Isn't it all bass and bluegill? The short answer is No. Most ponds around Pinellas County drain or are fed by some form of saltwater which means fun fun. I found times when fishing the flats or the beach is not going to

happen. Either I just have an hour to fish on the way home from work, the wind is not cooperating, or I just don't want to get wet. The answer... ponds and small lakes. Do you live on a pond? Does your best friend and their spouse? Ask to fish it! Even my in-laws who live in Venice are on a small pond that holds cichlids, bass, and bluegill.

Start looking on your favorite map app for a body of water around you. Yes, it may not be fishable, either the dreaded no fishing between Memorial Day and Labor day, (what the heck is that rule in this county? This is Florida. We fish year round!) or its completely covered in mangroves, but check it out. Try not to walk the water empty handed saying to yourself, "Man I wonder if there are fish in here." There are, and you are gonna spook them the minute you run back to get your rod.

The first picture is my largest snook on a fly at a pond. He ate so close to shore and it was the best snook fight yet for me. Three jumps and it took me

At the last minute he wore through my 20-lb leader and I had to grab him by the tail...still had my Cliff Nigh minnow in his mouth. In fact, ALL of the pictures of fish I have caught on this page are from the same pond. It's a half- mile south of the Alligator Lake spillway (which is always good to fish). I even go there when I know I should hit the flats on the right tide, but the key about a pond that you have caught a snook at is this: they are there today and tomorrow and many more days after that. As far as bass go, they really eat anything with lots of action, just throw out your line and set the hook.....just saying.

There are lots of other great fish to catch in ponds. Ladyfish, Mayan Cichlids, Gar, Bowfin and my least favorite --largemouth bass booooooooooo. Come to the next meeting, say HI, and tell me about your favorite pond stories. Until next month don't molest those gators...bring your bug spray (fire ants are real) and...*Strip strip strip!* --


Mark Hays: I recommend these fly fishing books



Mark Hays

My daughter Annie requested I list several of my favorite fly-fishing related books. This is her way of getting out of a requested article for the newsletter. She did promise me 75% of the royalties, but I doubt if the compensation policy has changed much since I wrote regular articles 20 years ago. Here are a few of my favorites in no particular order:

- 1) Black Bass and the Fly Rod by Charles Waterman 1993. Although this book is dated with older rods, reels, and fly line, the fishing techniques have not changed at all. The same bugs and locations still apply, and Charlie's stories are great. He was fortunate to have a wife who shared his love of fly fishing, and he lived in a less hectic time period than we do now.
- 2) Book of the Tarpon by A.J. Dimock 1926. Talk about an old book! A.J. wintered in SW Florida in a time when every day on the water was an adventure. Much of this book is about chasing Tarpon with harpoons and hand lines ala a Hemingway novel. He also fly-fished with bamboo fly rods. He mostly fished out of small row boats and canoes. The highlights of this book are the fantastic photos taken by his brother. Makes you realize how spoiled we are with iPhone cameras and flats skiffs.
- 3) *Ultimate Guide to South Florida on Foot* by Steve Kanter 2014. All I can say is, do not go to South Florida and the Everglades without this book.
- 4) Dark Waters by Russell Chatham 1991. Not only is Russell a world-class fly-fisherman and caster, he is also a painter. He grew up in California fly-fishing for steelhead and striped bass. This is quite an eclectic group of stories from Montana to the Keys.
- 5) The Longest Silence- A Life in Fly Fishing by Thomas McGuane 1999. Thomas is an author of numerous books and screenplays. He currently lives in Montana. His book is a set of reflections on fishing from home to the Bahamas and Keys. Surly, sarcastic, and witty, this book is a great read for a life-long fisherman.
- 6) Sex, Death, and Fly Fishing by John Gierach 1990. John has penned a dozen books all pertaining to fly fishing. If you are looking for fishing techniques, this is not the book for you. Most of his writings are observations of why we fish. His wit is obvious by his titles alone, and I must say I have enjoyed all of his books. You have to love a title that encapsulates all of life in five words. "When the fly hatch you were expecting doesn't come off, knowing the Latin names of the insects lets you piss and moan in a dead language."
- 7) Redfish Bluefish Shefish Snook by E Donall Thomas, Ph.D 2007. What can I say about a man who has accomplished so much in his life? Don Has written a dozen or more books. He currently just retired from medical practice, writes for Just Labs magazine, Fly Rod and Reel, Gray's Sporting Journal, and is coeditor of Traditional Bowhunter Magazine. Annie and I met him at a Traditional Bowhunters of Florida shoot where he spoke, and he published one of Annie's archery articles. He has traveled the world from Siberia to New Zealand with flyrod and longbow in hand. He has shared all of these adventures with his readers. It seems impossible that one man can be so accomplished, but we have dined with him and he is the real deal.



Capt. Pat Damico: Captain's Corner



Just for starters: Get out of your boat and wade fish

Beautiful sunny windless days may be great for a lot of things but fly fishing isn't one of them unless you make some adjustments. Very clear water, especially in the gulf, has presented many issues when sight casting. Snook are still around and share their water close to shore with baby tarpon. If we can easily see fish at a distance, how do we appear to them? Not using a flats boat is a good start. Use your boat to get to fish that are undisturbed, then wade if the bottom is suitable. It is even better to stay on land away from the water when fish are close to shore. Avoid a shadow or flash from the sun on your equipment. Leave brightly colored clothes at home. Blend in with the water or sky. Minimize what

you carry. Metal fly boxes, hemostats, clippers, reflective sunglasses, even light-colored skin can be covered to allow a closer approach as well as sun protection. Wear a neutral-colored wide brim hat with a dark underside to improve vision with good polarized sunglasses. A good pair of fly fishing gloves should also have a thicker area to prevent cut fingers from frequent stripping of the fly line while working a fly. The new distance fly lines that have a rough texture cut skin easily. Long thinner tapered leaders, often 12-15 feet, will keep the thicker fly line away from the fish. Cast accurately and allow the smaller fly to land on the water softly, well ahead of a moving fish. Very long casts are necessary; practice them with an absolute minimum of false casting.
